From the Pastor's Desk

In the Lattimer house when I was growing up, we were quiet every Saturday night from 6 - 8pm. We were listening to *A Prairie Home Companion* on the radio. It was Garrison Keillor's variety show, filled with music and jokes and stories. The highlight was *The News from Lake Woebegone* - stories of the comings and goings of the folk

from Garrison's imagined home town. We just loved stories. Mom says that I put myself to sleep most nights, even when I was young, staying up late reading books. There's just something about stories...

Did you ever wonder why the all-powerful God of the universe would choose to reveal himself through ancient texts - through stories instead of theological descriptions? Maybe it's fitting that God's self-revelation comes through narrative. Stories speak to deeper realities, to complexities that challenge simplistic descriptions. If you're describing a machine, then some sort of technical manual serves best. Sometimes we try to offer a simplified technical manual version of God. But the God of the Bible is something different - something terrible and wonderful and unpredictable. The incredible witness of the Bible is that God is a person. Transcendent yet living. God is a person, the creator in real relationship with the created.

Stories are powerful. They speak to deep places within us, reaching past the part of our brains that deal with interesting facts. As Frederick Buechner says, stories reach down to the place inside of us where dreams are born. (See *Telling the Truth*, p. 4) Stories speak to the parts of us that define us. Our deepest connections with others are with those who get us - those who know our story, and whose story is in turn known by us. Stories, the deep narratives, remind us who we are and give us visions of who we want to be.

So, beginning in March, we are going to be reading stories together. Jesus knew the power of stories, and in worship each week, we'll explore together Jesus' parables. You can help us build up the worship center at the front too. Bring in your favorite books - the stories that have helped shaped you over the years. (Write your name in the books, so they can find their way back home at the end of the series.) After church, feel free to come up front and look through the books that have been most meaningful to the people around you.

We'll also be starting a Stone Church book club! We'll have short stories available for different age groups. Take one home, read it through, and leave your thoughts and reflections on the attached page. Bring it back the next week, and pick up a new story - reading it and the reflections of others who have read it before.



In Sunday School the youngest among us will be continuing to read stories of God's care for us. In our adult classes you can choose between reading Jesus Stories from the Gospel of Luke, or stories of God at work around us amidst the Powers and Principalities in the Sojourners class. There will also be a class for those thinking about baptism and membership - learning about the story of the Brethren Church, and looking at how your own story ties in both here and now, as well as to the broader tale God has been weaving since the beginning of time.

There are so many ways to get involved. We hope you'll join us this month - hearing stories and sharing your own!

Class Follow-up on Planned Action

Our Stone Church Sr High Sunday School youth had the opportunity to live out one of the messages from this past summer's National Youth Conference. The message was "widen the circle" by reaching out in love and inviting others to the table. During class, we explored who among the members of the community are outsiders, either by choice, by circumstance or because of societal norms. The list was extensive and included prisoners, those hospitalized, the homeless, etc. We brainstormed ways we could reach out in love to each group, widening our circle in the process. My challenge to the class was to select one group with whom to live out the message of sharing love. They chose visiting elderly shut-ins. (The group that is "with us in spirit.")

January 6th, seven of our Sr High Youth and two teachers ventured to Arista Care to deliver a message of love, with Christmas cookies, to Orpha Hearn and Howard Crouch. It was serendipitous that it was also Orpha's 93rd birthday! The group presented her with a birthday cake and sang a rousing rendition of Happy Birthday. As the group introduced themselves, Orpha shared memories of them as children or babies, as well as their parents and grandparents. It was a time rich with community. After the short birthday celebration, half stayed to visit further with Orpha while the other half ventured down the hall to visit with Howard, age 94.

The groups experienced two completely different perspectives of Stone Church, particularly in regards to senior living in a nursing home. Orpha was upbeat, thankful for her friends at Stone and their love and support, as she shared her memories since the first time she attended Stone at age 3 days. And Howard, always the teacher, offered perspectives on current events and volunteered a listening ear if they ever needed to talk. Several youth commented on how sharp their minds were. The group shared the experience during worship, thus connecting the congregation to the event, in essence bringing Orpha and Howard's spirit, message and memories to the table. In widening their circle, the youth brought joy and love to Howard and Orpha that will no doubt linger beyond that one day. And in the weeks that followed, the youth reflected on their experience and continue to consider their next steps. When you see the youth, be sure to ask them about their Arista Care trip!

Work for a cause – not applause; live to express – not impress. Don't pose to be seen – make your absence noticed. We use these and other "common sense" values help guide our lives.

The influence of the Hebrew Bible and the Christian New Testament, also give rise to values that show us how to live. These "common sense" values provide moral balance in a seemingly unbalanced world, according to an article by Dr. Richard Lee, founding pastor of the First Redeemer Church in Atlanta, Georgia.

One of the focal points for us as Christians is this verse from Deuteronomy 6: "Hear, O Israel, the Lord our God, the Lord is one." It's called the "Shema" (which means "to hear" in English). The rest of the passage goes like this, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength. These commandments that I give you today are to be upon your hearts. Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk down the road; when you lie down, and when you get up... write them on the doorposts of your houses and on your gates."

We read in Proverbs 1:7 that "the fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge."

It has been written, "think of these words as you age. As you get older, you really just want to be surrounded by good people – good for you, good to you, and good for your soul."

The great American statesman, Daniel Webster, was once asked what the most sobering thought was that entered his mind. He quickly responded by stating, "My personal accountability to God."


