Retreat Recap ~ February 2017 Submitted by Brooke Meadows, Moderator

Picture this...the story of Stone Church as told on a treasure map. Instead of one red X marking the spot, we find our treasures everywhere: in the people we encounter and the experiences we share. Our congregational retreat focused on our journey together, as we continue to map out who we are and where we are going.

We began with an update on the Search Team, which resumes its work in March after being put on hold for nearly a year to allow for further discernment. Then we spent time discussing the

vision statement and mission depiction (originally presented during January's forum). The latest version involves an upside-down tree! Copies are available in the church office. Feedback was very positive.

Then Chuck Yohn unveiled the pastoral staffing model developed by the Discovery Team and affirmed by the Leadership Team. In brief, it recommends 1.5 FTE pastoral staff for a total of 75 hours/week. FTE means Full-Time Equivalency. This model includes one full-time pastor and one half-time pastor who compliments the interests and skills of the full-time pastor. Alternatively, a pastoral team (married or otherwise) may apply together. This model sounds similar to what we have now with Pastor Christy serving full time and Pastor Anna Lisa serving half time. However, the two of them currently work about 100 combined hours/week. The point is that in order to live into our vision and mission, we need to set boundaries for which tasks our pastors will handle and which tasks will be held by the rest of us. Copies of the staffing model can also be requested in the office.

We broke out into small groups to discuss the staffing model and generate questions for a "panel of experts" (pictured above). But first we ate cookies and reflected on upcoming transitions in leadership: Marty Keeney's

Annual Conference 2017 June 28 – July 2 Grand Rapids, MI DeVos Convention Center

General registration is open for the 2017 Annual Conference of the Church of the Brethren in Grand Rapids, MI from March 1 through June 5. The theme is "Risk Hope." We live in times that challenge us in our quest to be a faithful people. Strife and uncertainty permeate our society and invade our churches, and we grow disheartened and discouraged. Yet Scripture teaches that troubled times can be times when God's blessing is most evident in the midst of God's people. We are not to fear the instability of our time, for our hope rests in the rock of our salvation. Isaiah reminds us: "Do not call conspiracy all that this people calls conspiracy, and do not fear what it fears, or be in dread. But the Lord of hosts, him you shall regard as holy; let him be your fear, and let him be your dread." (Is, 8:12-13)

As we face the various storms or our times we gain strength and hope from the stories of God's people in exile in Babylon. Robbed of the Land, the Temple, and the City of God, and hauled away to a foreign land, the People of God had little hope for survival. And yet, the promises of God would not die.

Isaiah prophesied: "And this shall be a sign for you: This year eat what grows of itself, and in the second year what springs from that; then in the third year sow, reap, plant vineyards, and eat their fruit. The surviving remnant of the house of Judah shall again take root downward, and bear fruit upward; for from Jerusalem a remnant shall go out, and from Mount Zion a band of survivors. The zeal of the Lord of hosts will do this." (Is. 37: 30-32)

And so the people gathered together the stories of their ancestors, the promises to Abraham, to Isaac and to Jacob, the call to Moses and the Covenant of the Law, and there in Babylon they were faithful.

In the same way, let us too be bold in this time of challenge – bold to turn aside from our despair, to step out in faith, to claim the promises that are ours in Christ Jesus, and to Risk Hope for the life and vitality of the Gospel.

"Let us hold fast to the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who has promised is faithful." Heb. 10:23

Farmers' Market Bucks Are Back

What are Huntingdon Farmers' Market Bucks? They're "fake money" that can be used like cash at the Huntingdon Farmers' Market. They come in \$1 and \$10 denominations.

Why purchase Market Bucks? To commit...

- to eating more fresh, nutritious, locally-grown food
- to supporting and strengthening the market, its environmentally-responsible farmers and our local economy
- to increasing access to the market for folks who otherwise couldn't afford it
- to enhancing our sense of our community



How will Market Bucks help folks otherwise unable to afford shopping at the market?

Donations may be made toward the purchase of Market Bucks for use by persons who get government food assistance (*i.e.* SNAP benefits, formerly known as Food Stamps, now on EBT cards). When folks use their EBT cards at the market, they'll receive \$1 of "Bonus Bucks" (donated Market Bucks) for each \$2 they spend. Additionally, 5% of Market Bucks proceeds will be given to Huntingdon County PRIDE, which uses those funds to purchase Market Bucks for distribution to its elderly clients.

How can one buy Market Bucks and/or make donations to support the "Bonus Bucks" program? Market Bucks purchases and donations may be made using cash or check:

- in the back of the sanctuary following worship on Sunday mornings (April and May)
- at the Stone Church office Mon-Fri mornings (April through October; see Debbie)
- at the Farmers' Market (all season May through October)
- at the PRIDE office, 1301 Mt. Vernon Ave., Huntingdon (Smithfield Twp.), Mon-Fri, 8:30-4:30 (April through October)

At the 2016 Annual Conference a Creation Care Committee was appointed in response to the query, "Continuing the Study of Our Christian Responsibility to Care for God's Creation", and I am privileged to serve as chair of the three-person group (also including Laura Dell-Haro and Duane Deardorff). We have interpreted our charge as a call to catalyze action within the denomination to increase renewable energy usage and energy efficiency at the denominational, congregational and individual level.


In order to determine what resources would help congregations and individuals achieve this goal, we sent out a short survey (thank you to those who completed it!). With almost 500 responses, we found that specific information and recommendations, as well as contact information for resource people within the denomination were the most requested resources. We are now working to determine how to best provide those resources. If you would like to be a part of the Brethren Creation Care network, please let me know!

I was also able to attend the Presidential Forum entitled "God's Green Earth" at Bethany Seminary in March, and led two sessions on the work our committee has been doing. It was an energizing two days with lots of information and great networking.

Loving your neighbor, by choosing renewable energy?

Did you know that Stone Church has chosen to purchase 100% renewable energy as part of faith commitment? Burning fossil fuels, including the negative impacts on air quality and climate change, has a disproportionate impact on the poor. As a faith community, I believe we should not be comfortable taking actions that lead to drought, hunger, and increased poverty and that we have a responsibility to begin the transition to renewable energy.

You can choose renewable energy wherever you live. In many places you can switch directly to renewable sources by going to www.papowerswitch.com. If your power provider is Valley Rural Electric, you can choose to purchase renewable energy credits.
