From the Pastor's Desk

Nigerian Women Theologians

We have an exciting opportunity to help support and build relationships with women theologians in Nigeria this summer. What began as a conversation and a time of sharing among women has grown into something with a broader impact for our denomination.

Mrs. Mary Yohanna and Dr. Yamtikarya Joseph Mshelia, two Women Theologians and leaders in the E.Y.N. (Church of the Brethren in Nigeria) are planning to attend Annual Conference in Cincinnati in July 2018. This is a first for them and for us!

Sisters Mary and Yamtikarya will join us for our celebration of 60 years of ordained ministry for women in the Church of the Brethren! They will attend the clergy women's breakfast on Friday morning and also will present an Insight Session through the Office of Ministry. It is our hope that this visit will provide many opportunities to build long and lasting friendships with our Nigerian sisters.

Included in their visit is the possibility of "extra-curricular" activities before and after conference, such as a visit to Bethany Theological Seminary, the offices in Elgin and a visit to Washington D.C. and advocacy work on "the Hill."

The cost of the trip for both of the women will total approximately \$6000 (\$3000 each). That includes air and ground travel, registration, lodging at conference, food, etc. You are invited to consider whether you want to make an individual donation to help cover the costs of this trip.

Farmers' Market Bucks Are Back

What are Huntingdon County Farmers' Market Bucks? They're "fake money" that can be used like cash at the Huntingdon and Mount Union farmers' markets. They come in \$1 and \$10 denominations.

Why purchase Market Bucks? To commit...

- to eating more fresh, nutritious, locally-grown food
- to supporting and strengthening the market, its environmentally-responsible farmers and our local economy
- to increasing access to the market for folks who otherwise couldn't afford it
- to enhancing our sense of our community



How will Market Bucks help folks otherwise unable to afford shopping at the market?

Donations may be made toward the purchase of Market Bucks for use by persons who get government food assistance (*i.e.* SNAP benefits, formerly known as Food Stamps, now on EBT cards). When folks use their EBT cards at the market, they'll receive \$1 of "Bonus Bucks" (donated Market Bucks) for each \$2 they spend. Additionally, for every \$20 of Market Bucks sold, \$1 in Market Bucks will be given to Huntingdon County PRIDE, for distribution to its elderly clients.

How can one buy Market Bucks and/or make donations to support the "Bonus Bucks" program?

Market Bucks purchases and donations may be made using cash or check:

- in the back of the sanctuary following worship on Sunday mornings (8 April - 20 May)
- at the Stone Church office Mon-Fri mornings (April through October; see Debbie)
- at the farmers' markets (all season – May through October; June – Sept in Mt Union)
- at the PRIDE office, 1301 Mt. Vernon Ave., Huntingdon (Smithfield Twp.), Mon-Fri, 8:30-4:30 (April through October)

June 16, 1936 – April 7, 2018

Eva and Dale met at the Church of the Brethren's annual conference in Long Beach, California back in 1961. They went on to travel the world together, helping others all along the way. Eva grew up in Lebanon county, and came to Juniata College to study Home Economics. She went on to teach, and raised two children, David and Marianne. Those kids grew up to have children of their own (Sarah, Paul, Elizabeth, and Alexander), making Dale and Eva proud grandparents. Eva cared for others around the world, on trips to Vienna and Guatemala. She was an advocate for peace in a world full of wars and rumors of wars.

Eva was a mover and a shaker. In this community, her work has touched the lives of so many. She helped set up the home for battered women, worked with the Office of Aging, helped found the local Habitat for Humanity chapter, and served with the League of Women Voters. She was also instrumental with the refugee resettlement program. In this church, she served as a deacon, chaired the Witness Team, and taught Sunday school. She is missed. Our thoughts and prayers remain with Dale and their family.

MESSENGER MUSINGS

THE MERRY MONTH OF MAY



The month of May has long been one of my favorite months, maybe the favorite. Winter was only a memory. Summer was a promise coming on. The robin had come out of hiding. Flowers were abloom with color. The days were warm.

Now, global warming makes May a toss-up. Will it be the May I remember or cold like this April and full of floods and other natural disasters.

I try hard to remember the words one of my favorite singers, Art Garfunkel, sang at the end of the movie "As Good As It Gets": "Always look on the bright side of life. Always look on the light side of life... When you're chewing on life's gristle, don't grumble, give a whistle, this'll help things turn out for the best.... If life seems jolly-rotten, there's something you've forgotten, and that's to laugh and smile and dance and sing! When you're feeling in the dumps, don't be silly chumps. Just purse your lips and whistle, that's the thing!"

I spent parts of March in hospitals with the discovery of a duodenal ulcer and leg problems. I'm getting around on a walker now. While there, I was visited by friends from Stone Church and three chaplains of various denominations. In Altoona, they gave me a booklet of "Prayers for Healing Body, Mind and Spirit." Two that I'd like to share:

"Lord, make me an instrument of your peace. Where there is hatred...let me sow love. Where there is injury...pardon. Where there is doubt...faith. Where there is despair...hope. Where there is darkness...light. Where there is sadness...joy. It is in giving that we receive. It is in pardoning that we are pardoned. It is in dying that we are born to eternal life. Amen."

And one you may find more familiar: "Precious Lord, take my hand. Lead me on, let me stand. I am tired. I am weak. I am worn. Through the storm, through the night, lead me on to the light. Take my hand, precious Lord, and lead me home."

I have been given another little booklet, titled "The Simple Teachings of Jesus." One small part of its 15 pages reads: "A common view of Christianity goes something like this – I believe in the simple teachings of Jesus. My religion is to live by the golden rule – Do unto others as you would have them do unto you.... Jesus taught tolerance and love for one another and respect for human goodness. Let us have the simple teachings of Jesus...."
