1...2...3...4...5....20....50...100...Switch hands....1...2...3...4...5...20...50...100...Switch hands. It's hard to estimate how many hours I spent in my basement as a young teen, sitting on a bucket with my eyes closed, dribbling a basketball. When it was too cold to shoot outside, when I wanted to be alone, when I didn't want to do my homework, I would go practice dribbling. I loved it - the feel of the leather in my hand, the consistency of how it would return over and over to my fingertips. It wasn't just learning to dribble without looking; I wanted to learn to dribble without thinking. I had other things to think about: the set of the defense, which play to call, what the coach was telling me from the sideline, where the open spot on the floor was going to be. And so I practiced, eyes shut on that bucket, I practiced a lot. And loved it.

We began our worship series, "The Life You've Always Wanted" in September, but it will continue throughout October and into November. Our hope is that we can re-frame spiritual disciplines (I like to call them spiritual practices) from being dry, boring, shaming things into being life-giving, soul-lifting, fruitful choices that bring us closer to the people (and church) we want to be.

We all know how awful it is to be told to do one more thing in our already busy lives. We also know what it's like to be told that things will just get better if we do this other truly miserable thing. (On a side note - that's why I'm not in the WNBA - while I loved dribbling, weight lifting was truly miserable to me which eliminated shooting well, boxing out, and other necessary parts of the sport! Also, I'm short.) The reality is we just don't do those practices that we find miserable or boring or shaming.

At the same time, most of us also know what it is to not quite be living as our best selves or to not be quite as connected to God or the people around us as we wish. We have so many things to think about in our lives, it would be nice if we had rhythms in place that helped us do it without it feeling like a burden or a huge extra task.

And so while we are spending several weeks looking at particular spiritual disciplines - I hope you hear an invitation to experiment. What practices give you life? What's something new to you? What did you try and hate? How are the choices you are making helping (or working against) you becoming your best self?

I know that I am not always as disciplined as I think I should be. I'm not as patient or joyful as I want to be. I certainly could be more present and centered. And I know I can't just try harder and become those things. So, I'm doing some experiments. I'm just going to start doing some things differently. I'm not going to overanalyze where to start or how - I'm choosing to just start and see what happens. Maybe some of those practices will stick and I'll surprise myself with some growth.

I know you don't need one more thing to do. But I wonder if you'll come tell me about the experiments you have during this season. I'd love to hear - and to have some practice partners on the way!

## Stone Church Leadership Team Report September 2018



# "Continuing the work of Jesus. Peacefully. Simply. Together." Submitted by Dennis Plane

### "A Pebble in the Shoe of Society"

Ben started our last Leadership Team meeting by asking what we thought the calling of Stone Church was. We discussed the importance of being a witness for the college and for college students. We praised our welcoming attitude, especially toward those who might not be welcome elsewhere. Some churches only want "true believers"; indeed, 86% of Christians in a recent Pew survey said that "believing in God" was "an essential part of what it means to be a Christian."\* But Stone Church opens our arms to all regardless of their current relationship with God. A member of Leadership Team said that the world is too busy trying to put Christians in a box, and the Stone Church was called to boldly demonstrate that Christianity cannot be boxed—that there are too many faces of Christianity as to defy labels. We are called to prison ministry. We are called to make justice a central part of the conversation—to righting injustice in the world, to tackling prejudice and bigotry, to educating about environmental degradation.

And, according to one Leadership Team member, we are called to be the "pebble in the shoe of society." We are called to be that annoying bit of stone that sometimes makes trouble in an otherwise smooth stride. We are called to be irksome when necessary. We are called to be discomforting when the ways of the world need to be changed. We are called to be agitators when we see injustice. And we are called to be noticed as we spread the love of God and the good news of Jesus.

Only 14% of Christians believe that the buying from companies that pay fair wage is an essential part of being a Christian. We at Stone Church are called to host the Alternative Gifts Bazaar. Only 22% of Christians believe it important to work to protect the environment. Stone Church feels called to support climate change awareness. We are, indeed, called to be pebbles.

So as you go about being a pebble, think about which apple carts need to be upset. Think about where Christ is calling you. Is He calling you to help out with Christian Education? Is He calling you to spread the word about global warming? Is He calling you to be a receptive ear for a friend or neighbor? Is he calling you to help with Hospitality? Is he calling you to civil disobedience? Is He calling you to civic volunteerism? Is He calling you to spend more quality time with those you love?

There are lots of pebbles on the beach. What sort of pebble is God calling you to be?


#### **COMPELLING VISION**

## **AED** (automated external defibrillator)

Now Available for Emergency Use

The church has purchased an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) for use in the case of a heart related emergency within the building. The AED is a device that automatically analyzes the heart rhythm and, if it detects a problem that may respond to an electrical shock, it delivers a shock to restore a normal heart rhythm.

The good news is that the AED makes it simple for nearly anyone to use in an emergency by providing both verbal directions to the user as well as built-in safety protocols to prevent its use in situations that may not be appropriate for an AED.

The Stone Church AED is located in the office area just to the right of the elevator. A time to learn about the AED will be scheduled in the near future for those who would like to understand it better.
