Join the Students of Juniata College to Stop Hunger, Both Locally and Globally!


On November 16th, the Juniata College Christian Fellowship will be hosting the annual Meal for CROP. For this event, Juniata College students voluntarily give up their evening meal, which is then sold to a member of the Huntingdon community. Three-quarters of the proceeds go to CROP, a subsidiary of Church World Service, to fund hunger relief and self-help projects around the world by sending relief money, tools, seeds, and food directly to the people who need them. The remaining amount is donated to the Huntingdon Area Food Bank. In the past twenty years, this event has raised over \$50,000 to help in the fight against hunger, both here in our own county and around the world.

We invite you to join us in this year's all you can eat meal, which will be held on Wednesday, November 16, 2016 from 5:30-7:30 PM in the Baker Dining Hall of Ellis Hall. Tickets are \$10.00 for adults, \$5.00 for children ages 6-12, and free for children 5 and under.

I look forward to gathering with you in these ways - Anna Lisa




Thanks for making our kids a priority!

HAPPENINGS

Bruce Lidston and I describe the mission of the property team as: To provide facilities for the Stone Church congregation that support the programs and missions of the church and the Ministry Team. The building is to be safe, secure, and inviting to all.

We are very blessed as a congregation to have such a beautiful and stately 100 plus year old property to worship in. Maintaining it however does create challenges at times as we have unexpected and/or irregular expenses that are hard to budget for.

A big thank you to the Finance Team and Leadership team for the creation of the "Property Projects Fund" that was incorporated into our annual stewardship appeal. Another big thank you to congregation members that have pledged and given to the fund.

Here is an update of what we have been using the funds for:

- Repair of multiple leaks in the rubber roof on the Bell Tower
- Repair of ice damage to roof, spouting and light over outside doors on Fellowship Hall.
 (Insured loss with \$1,000.00 deductible)
- Replacement of old phone system that had been regularly dropping calls
- Replacement of office printer that was malfunctioning
- Repair of water pressure valves and urinals in the men's bathrooms
- Repair/replacement of two air conditioning compressors that failed
- Replacement of the church kitchen freezer
- Repairs to and painting door trim and header on the Moore Street Bell Tower entrance
- Planning to clean carpets in basement hallway and room 102 soon
- Repair of several stair banisters

Your continued support of this fund has allowed us to respond to emergency and unexpected needs without disrupting the annual church budget.
