YOUTH AND COLLEGE



Stone Church's Christian Ed Team led the process of gathering supplies for 60 Emergency Cleanup Buckets! With contributions from Juniata College, Huntingdon Presbyterian, Westminster Woods and local United Methodists, we collected about \$5,000 in supplies and cash donations for Church World Service.



The buckets are now at the Brethren Service Center in MD and will be loaded into this truck to go to communities recovering from disasters.



A wagon-full of other cleaning supplies (which couldn't be used for buckets) went to Huntingdon's Humane Society!

Sharing my journey with you in church and on the CaringBridge site has been helpful to me in dealing with this disease.

Telling the Truth

When I write a column I try to be humorous. I met Dave Witkovsky a number of years ago when he led a group of Juniata College students working on a home occupied by my girlfriend, now my wife. Ever since, I've had a soft spot in my heart for Rev. Witkovsky. Several weeks ago I heard him preach at church.

When you meet a friend on the street and he asks how you are, how do you answer? Do you answer the way you really feel or is it just a greeting? Most of the time I think we're just expressing a greeting. You may be really sick but you say, "I'm fine." This was the subject of David's sermon. I found it touching and very meaningful. David spoke about the Bible story, when the paralyzed man was lowered down through the roof to seek help from Jesus. The man was paralyzed; Jesus healed him.

Like the paralyzed man, David preached about how we need each other, yet we live in a culture in which dependency on another human being is seen as a sign of weakness, rather than a sign of strength. We want a church and family and friends where we are free to say, "I'm really struggling right now!" and not be seen as weak.

David said he found strength in being in his moments of weakness, knowing that his weakness does not define him. In our church, David said, we have a group of people who see us when we're weak. "Regardless of how I feel about myself," he said, "there are people around me at Stone Church who care and support me when I truly say how I feel."

Rise Against Hunger

On Sunday, October 22, Rose Rahman and Jeannie and Maggie Lashlee attended Rise Against Hunger at the Huntingdon Community Center. Rise Against Hunger (formerly Stop Hunger Now) packs meals and sends them to hungry families all around the world, even to hurricane relief centers.



The meal packing process:

1. Add the nutrition packet. It may be small, but it has enough nutrients to sustain 6 people for a full day!
2. Add soy, rice and dried vegetables.
3. Weigh and seal the bag.
4. When 36 bags are sealed, the meals get packed in a box and put back in the truck that the ingredients came in on.
5. Every 5,000 meals, the coordinator bangs a gong as loud as he can and we cheer as loud as we can. (That was my Mom's favorite part.)

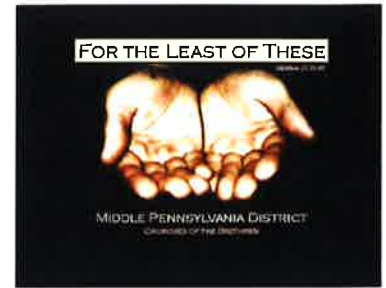
We packed 20,000 meals before we ran out of vegetables. At 6 servings per bag, we helped feed 120,000 people!

District Conference Report

Emily Elder, Henry Thurston-Griswold, Daisy & Jeff Decker, Carolyn & Bruce Lidston, Anna Lisa Gross, Dean Wenger, Betty Ann Cherry, Donna & Loren Rhodes and Mary Garvey participated in our district's conference Oct 13 and 14 at the Maitland Church of the Brethren in Lewistown. Maitland hosted us graciously and fed us extravagantly (though the disposable dishes were hard to stomach).



The Middle PA District (like all 24 districts in the Church of the Brethren) gathers annually for a conference of worship, business and reports. This year our District Conference business was simply accepting reports, approving the slate of nominations, budget, etc. Brian Bert (Program Coordinator at Camp Blue Diamond) moderated with a gentle spirit, and began a new tradition of passing the basin and towel (rather than the gavel) to next year's moderator as a sign of the servant leadership Jesus calls us to.

Henry shares that a highlight was David Radcliff's sermon and sharing. His message fit perfectly with the District Conference theme *"For the least of these,"* taken from the Matthew 25 passage where Jesus tells his followers that when they cared for the hungry, the thirsty, the naked, and the prisoners, they were caring for him. As David stressed, if we're not focusing on the poor and most vulnerable in our world, then we're missing Jesus in our lives. We appreciated learning about the local ministries that the Middle PA District supports—Trucker Traveler Ministry, Chaplains in the Park, Camp Blue Diamond, Susquehanna Valley Ministry Center, etc.—and receiving updates from the various agencies and arms of the denomination, such as Bethany Theological Seminary and On Earth Peace. As Carolyn pointed out in worship Oct 15, Stone Church isn't contributing to the Pennies for Witness program that had raised over \$5,400 by the end of District Conference (average of \$100 per congregation for the district's 55 congregations). However this year's goal for Pennies for Witness was \$10,000.

All 55 churches in the district are expected to give to the district based on their size. (Stone Church gave \$10,100 in 2016.) We passed the district's 2018 budget of \$226,271 with an \$8,866 deficit. Carolyn is concerned that we had no discussion about this district or the lack of Youth leadership.

The tone of business was kind and patient (and no controversial topics were on the agenda this year, which Dean says is normal for Middle PA). As Jeff notes, the business pieces of District Conference were conducted and inspired by references to "the least of these" from Matthew 25 and Middle PA District churches come together to meet some of the needs outside the walls of our church buildings. Bruce and others are concerned that we didn't discuss the controversies that are so pronounced throughout our denomination, such as same-sex weddings.

We enjoyed celebrating Stone members all over conference: Dean shared in the Camp Blue Diamond report, including positive momentum in their capital campaign. Loren Rhodes was elected Standing Committee rep. Betty Ann Cherry was honored for completing her second term as Coordinating Team Chair (particularly important leadership during this time of transition in our district). Dave Witkovsky brought the Juniata College report, along with Juniata student (and Maitland CoB member) Maria Fowler. Donna Rhodes gave the Susquehanna Valley Ministry Center report.

Emily also noted David Radcliff's energy and passion global discipleship. "Even though I've heard him a number of times, I am always inspired to listen and watch others connect with his message. As I am new to being Brethren, I enjoyed getting in a different church and looking at their layout, methods, Sunday school signage, and other organizational materials. It is great to share stories and fellowship and learn from brothers and sisters in faith."

Donations at other times may

IN OCTOBER, 39 jars of Peanut Butter, 9 cans of veggies, and 1 box spaghetti and jar sauce were donated during the third Sunday monthly offering to this local ministry; and \$115.00 in cash was donated toward Farmer's Market Bonus Bucks, which support fresh veggie and fruit purchases for families who receive SNAP.
