Keillor in his *News from Lake Woebegon* used to tell about the Christmas routine of Pastor Ingqvist's wife Judy. Each year at Christmastime, Judy would go around visiting, checking in with the women of the church one by one - and offering *absolution*. She would go around offering grace - as the realities of their lives meant they could never quite live up to the towering memories of Christmas from their childhood. Working jobs, caring for their own children - or for their own parents... Judy would go around each year letting them know that it was OK - it was enough.

Because *it is* enough. *Christ is born*. The light is shining in the darkness! If you're looking for ways to step back from the busy-ness, to refocus as you start your days, Mary Garvey will be offering Morning Advent Meditations here at the church throughout the season. Join us for the Christmas Pageant on the 15th, and for Caroling on the 22nd. Maybe 2019 has been a hard year all the way around. Maybe this Christmas season reminds you of the struggle and loss. Join us for the Longest Night Service on the evening of the 15th, as we seek the light that shines in the darkness together. And we will gather together with song and candlelight on Christmas Eve to celebrate the magic and the wonder of it all.

It is enough. It is *more* than enough. *Christ is born*. You are set free. The world is changed forever. Light shines in the darkness.

#### Sunday, the 15<sup>th</sup> — Longest Night Service, at 6pm



The Holiday Season is certainly one of hope and joy - but for many it can also be a time of sadness, pain, and loneliness. Many of us miss loved ones, have worries about the future, experience painful conflict in our families, or simply develop the winter blues. Sometimes we are left searching for healing and wholeness in the midst of parties and

presents. A Longest Night Christmas Service is a time of worship aimed at creating that space to acknowledge that there is often darkness and hurt at this time of year, mixed in with the hope and joy. It is a time where we recognize that we need God to come among us - we need God to be Emmanuel, God with us - in our fear, loneliness and pain, as well as in our celebration. #### 2019 Middle Pennsylvania **District Conference** October 12 **New Enterprise Church of the Brethren**

Once a year, representatives from churches of the Middle PA District gather for District Conference. It is an opportunity to hear about the church of the Brethren as a whole and about ministries supported by Middle District. Delegates vote to approve submitted reports detailing the work of those ministries and to affirm the nomination of various officers.

This year it was a one-day-only conference held on October 12<sup>th</sup> at the New Enterprise Church of the Brethren. According to delegate Carolyn Lidston, the new one day format worked surprising well! In part because advance materials were provided so delegates were able to read up on voting issues; and in part because Moderator Deb Gary, along with Moderator-Designate Rock Manges, set a steady and fairly quick pace. Our own Pastors Ben and Cindy offered a powerful and engaging sermon focused on the scripture "One day Jesus was praying. When He finished, one of His disciples said to Him, 'Lord, teach us to pray...'" Luke 11:1 (NIV).

New Enterprise Church members filled the space with seasonal decorations and went all out to make us feel welcomed. The day was rich with fellowship and inspirational reports of how God is working in Middle Pennsylvania and beyond. Reports were given by our District Executive Minister David Banaszak, and at least one delegate was a little fearful of what the reports would bring based on discussions from Annual Conference. But David encouraged members of the district, because of our ability to get along with others and accept the viewpoints of others despite the desire of some to split from the church. Such an outlook allows us to work together on our common concerns: our ministry as followers of Jesus here at home and elsewhere in the world. David went on to highlight various ministries in Middle PA by portraying a treasure hunter during an amusing skit. Those present heard from The Coordinating Team, Standing Committee, Ministers' Calling & Credentialing Team, Ministers' Education & Support Team, Ministry Formation, Shalom Team, Women's Programs, Youth Ministry, Disaster Response, Susquehanna Valley Ministry Center, Chaplain in the Park Ministry, Centre Peace and Trucker Traveler Ministries.

Our own Loren Rhodes gave a report in his role as a member of Standing Committee for Annual Conference. We are fortunate to have his thoughtful presence in that group which has a tremendous amount of influence on the decision making of our denomination as a whole. Loren shared the important concern that it has become increasingly challenging to find individuals in the denomination to serve in leadership roles at the denominational level. He encouraged us to take a moment during his report to think about volunteering or suggesting people to fill such roles. Anyone can do that by contacting him or the district office. I encourage all of the Stone Church folks to consider this very seriously as well. Nominations are being sought for Moderator-elect (3 year term), Program and Arrangements Committee (3 year term), Mission and Ministry Board (5 year term and Middle PA District has not had a representative since 2015). nominations yourself. We have a wonderful collection of capable people here at Stone, so I am hopeful that you will take this opportunity quite seriously.

Additionally, the 2019 Camp Blue Diamond Annual Meeting was held as part of District Conference during which attendees heard about the success of Camp's Capital Campaign. Donna Rhodes' report of SVMC was especially well written and informative! She invited those who have participated in SVMC's program to stand—making visible the wide reaching impact it has had in training ministers throughout our district.

It is useful for all of us to be aware that there is a movement with some traction in the Church of the Brethren (especially in neighboring districts) for some churches to separate from the denomination. It has become more than just a possibility. We learned about this in part of the District Executive report from David Banaszak. The exact form that this would take, how it would affect denominational structure and congregations, and when such a thing might occur are not clear. The claim by these churches is that this is over a difference surrounding questions of "Biblical authority." The movement has crystallized around differences of opinion concerning the role and acceptance of LGBTQ individuals in the church. At the same time, while this challenge may be threatening to tear the denomination apart, David was actually quite encouraged about how our district remains unified and functional despite significant differences of opinion from congregation to congregation and person to person. Indeed he was grateful and encouraged that our district stays together on more central issues of following the example of Jesus. It is good for all of us to be prayerfully mindful of this challenge that is weighing heavily upon our denomination.

Generosity and compassion was shown by all those present. Our District Conference Offering Emphasis was to collect money to purchase a *SARA-Flex Lift* for the Village at Morrison's Cove. Our offering total was \$2,920.00, and Middle PA District paid the balance of the cost. This device will greatly benefit patients and staff alike.

In addition, Stone Church presented the change members had been donating for *Pennies for Witness*, an offering emphasis on our outreach ministries: Trucker Traveler, CentrePeace, Prince Gallitzin Park Ministry, Small Church Fund, Outreach Ministry Matching Grants, Global Outreach. This year we collected \$112 to donate to this cause.

This report offers only a glimpse of this informative, social, and spiritual gathering and we encourage each of you to be a part of next year's District Conference. Gathering together is one way to maintain the spirit of goodwill and connection. To paraphrase a favorite hymn, *let's continue to be strangers no more but part of one big family* here in Middle PA!

#### Miguel Angel Asturias Academy | A Fair Start

As our faithful friends and partners at the Asturias Academy are completing their 24<sup>th</sup> year of providing an empowering education to their students, I write to thank you for your ongoing support of the school and to ask that you make as generous a financial contribution as you can so they can continue to offer their students the gift of a transformative education in the coming year. Several obstacles surfaced during the 2019 school year, but our partners always persevere and with limited resources achieve amazing results, summarized briefly below:

- 216 students enrolled this year, with a nearly equal gender distribution (52% male and 48% female), and all students successfully completed their grade, with the exception of six elementary students who were withdrawn from school by their families and taken illegally to the U.S. as part of the mass migration movement earlier this year
- 161 of the students received half scholarships and 55 were awarded full scholarships, making it possible for them to study at the school
- All students received computer software training in the school's two computer labs
- Four after-school clubs were created to provide support for a total of 100 students in the areas of math, science, art, music, and chess
- The school's medical and dental clinics, staffed by daughters Laura and Paty Chojolán, treated 120 and 150 patients respectively over the school year, including both students and their family members
- The school was able to enlist the support of a parent who is a psychologist at the end of the school year, who conducted interviews with 37 incoming new students to determine their capacities and needs as they start their studies at the Asturias Academy in January

Nearly 90% of our partner school's students come from low-income families, and without scholarship assistance, they would be unable to experience the life-changing education offered at the school. Tuition payments make up less than half of the \$120,000 annual operating budget that covers all the operating expenses of a pre-K through grade 11 education for over 200 students. That is only about \$50 a month to pay all the educational expenses for each student at the school!

In order to continue empowering Guatemalan youth to break the cycle of poverty and to build a more just and inclusive society, the Asturias Academy needs our support. As you consider year-end charitable contributions, remember that your monetary gift will have an extraordinary impact at the school. How many organizations can say that virtually 100% of donations go directly to program expenses? For only \$50 per month, under \$2 a day, you can provide a deserving child a full scholarship that covers tuition, all necessary school supplies, and a school uniform. A half scholarship costs less than \$1 per day, but any amount you can contribute will go a long way to help our partners accomplish their worthy mission.

The Guatemala Circle will once again participate in Stone Church's Alternative Christmas Gifts Bazaar on Saturday, December 7<sup>th</sup>. We will have a table there for alternative gift shoppers who wish to purchase scholarship gift cards to give a loved one for Christmas or to provide financial support for other needs at the school.

## 2019 Buck Season Wrap-Up

The Farmers' Market Bucks program, launched in 2010, had another successful year in 2019. Now under the auspices of the Huntingdon County Local Food Association, the Market Bucks program is a collaboration among Stone Church, the Huntingdon Area Forum of Churches, the Farmers' Market and a number of area community-service agencies. It involves locally-issued "market bucks" purchased for

one's personal use at the market, for gift-giving, or for donating on behalf of low-income members of our community. Its purposes include encouraging us all to eat more fresh, locally-grown food; supporting local, environmentally-responsible farmers and our region's

economy; and increasing access to the market for folks who otherwise couldn't afford to shop there. Donated Market Bucks (or "Bonus Bucks") are distributed to recipients of SNAP benefits (Food Stamps) when they shop at the market; they receive \$1 in Bonus Bucks for every \$2 of SNAP money they spend, extending their purchasing power.



#### Noteworthy in 2019:

- The Bonus Bucks matching program was extended to include senior citizens and mothers of young children using Farmers Market Nutrition Program (FMNP) produce vouchers; for each \$5 voucher used, customers received \$3 in Bonus Bucks.
- 5% of the value of all Market Bucks sold was donated to PRIDE. PRIDE used these
  proceeds to purchase \$235-worth of Market Bucks for distribution to its elderly clients.
- 51 SNAP recipients patronized the market, 34 of whom were new SNAP customers.
- A vegetable encyclopedia with information on using 36 different kinds of produce was distributed free-of-charge to SNAP and FMNP customers at the market. Thanks to Stone Church for helping to sponsor the printing of this guide!
- The market hosted monthly cooking demonstrations by local chefs with free samples!

Market Bucks for the 2020 season will be available for purchase in the spring. Details will follow in later newsletters. To all who participated in the Market Bucks / Bonus Bucks project this past season, many thanks on behalf of all of the partner organizations. Special thanks to Kim Roth, for helping out with sales, card-processing, and Bonus Bucks distribution. We welcome your feedback and/or your offers of assistance as we plan for 2020. # Gene's Jottings "COLORING CHRISTMAS"

Santa Claus—that supreme symbol of Christmas gift-giving, that jolly, round, bearded fellow bright in red and white – was inspired in large part by Clement Moore's 1822 poem "A Visit from St. Nicholas."

In 1931, to build winter sales, the Coca-Cola Company hired a talented commercial illustrator, Haddon Sundblom, who created the portly Cola-shaped Santa we know today under the Coke slogan "The Pause that Refreshes."

I'm writing these words this December to tell the story of why RED and GREEN today are the worldwide colors for our Christian celebration of CHRISTMAS.

Back in the 1300s, Adam and Eve's Day was celebrated on Christmas Eve. Churches presented a lot of plays because most people were illiterate. These religious plays were called the "Paradise Play" and portrayed what happened in the Garden of Eden. No apple trees were available in the winter, so apples were tied to a pine tree and it served as the tree that bore the forbidden fruit. This pine tree with the red apples eventually became a tradition in all churches.

Another explanation is that green symbolizes the hope Jesus gave us through his sacrifice and is the color of evergreens which stay alive all year. Red symbolizes the blood of Christ -- shed by Jesus so that people could be saved; and when combined with Green expresses the hope of our redemption through Christ's Sacrifice.

Howard Hayes Crouch June 24, 1924 – November 3, 2019

#### **Remembering Howard**

Howard Hayes Crouch, 95, was a resident of Huntingdon for more than 50 years. He was born in Warren, OH and married Hazel E. Black on June 15, 1947, in Columbus, OH. Hazel preceded him in death on March 8, 2017, after nearly 70 years of marriage. He is survived by his children, Marc, Eric and Marsha; five grandchildren; five great-grandchildren; and two great-grandchildren. Dr. Crouch participated in local choral groups and in productions at the McConnellstown Playhouse.

He served stateside in the U.S. Navy during World War II and the Korean War and was employed for 12 years as a public school teacher and administrator and then served as a professor at Juniata College, Huntingdon, for 28 years until his retirement in 1989.Dr. Crouch will be best remembered for his support of and participation in the performing arts in each community in which he resided; as well as his staunch support and advocacy for public education.

#### A Tribute to Howard - Richard Landrum

Howard came into my church office and asked for an appointment. He introduced himself, saying that I *had been recommended* by other college faculty. I welcomed Howard, and after a few introductory words he began to share his life story and his feelings. Our conversations continued for weeks. He began feeling better and joined the Stone Church with his wife Hazel. It is especially meaningful to have baptized Howard and received Hazel into membership with the Stone Church of the Brethren. Howard faithfully loved and helped care for his dear wife until her death in 2017.

They lived a few years in Florida, but returned to their home in Huntingdon for several good years. After Hazel's death and Howard's failing health he moved to Arista Care. He continued to minister to people around him, both residents and staff as well as to me personally. I grieve and miss my dear friend and peer in ministry as I compose these words, which cannot do justice to my admiration and love for Howard Crouch. I miss you Howard!

A memorial service will be held at Stone Church on Tuesday, December 4<sup>th</sup> at 10am.




