Ben has dreams that make me jealous - he dreams he is a superhero flying around. He wakes up empowered and excited. I have been known, however, to daydream. To think ahead and imagine. I am often guilty of over-dreaming - or overplanning - especially given what the reality of our

lives can actually hold. I am particularly susceptible to this around the Christmas season. "Continuing the work of Jesus. Peacefully. Simply. Together."

We are quickly approaching one of the busiest times of the church. A time both loved and, well, perhaps a little dreaded by church staff, as the joy and intensity of Advent comes upon us. This year, of course, will look a lot different. My thoughts first turned to how we can keep things the same despite COVID. But we can't, of course. Fortunately, your Leadership Team has a broader view than that. As I listened and contemplated at our November meeting, it was clear that the most important thing in mind was how to care for others, in part by creating new experiences, and in part by reinventing traditions.



Pastor Cindy shared with us the unsurprising increased need for pastoral care during this time, including to college students struggling to balance the challenges of college in a pandemic. They have also particularly reached out to parents with kids still at home. Summer Camp 2021

The staff at Camp Blue Diamond recently shared the following update about Summer Camp 2021: "Online registration is open and can be found at www.campbluediamond.org! Summer Camp brochures and registrations

will be sent to all past campers in January. Take advantage of the early-bird registration fee before March 1, which will be especially important if we need to limit the number of campers per session.

We are excited about the Summer Camp 2021 season, but we are mindful that it will look different as we navigate the realities of COVID19. There are still many unanswered questions, but considerations will be given to limiting the number of campers per session, operating in strict Family Groups (keeping the same small group of staff and campers together for all activities), hiring additional staff, and adding health and sanitation protocols. If affordable rapid testing is available we may be able to operate much as we have in the past, but it's too soon to know if testing will be an option.

Upon This Firm Foundation

Construction has begun on the third project of CBD's capital campaign, a new washhouse for the Family Campground. It is well underway, with the foundation and blockwork nearly completed. Camp hopes to have the building completed before the 2021 RV Campground season in May.

Miguel Angel Asturias Academy | A Fair Start

November 15, 2020

Celebrating a quarter century of providing a transformative education to Guatemalan children during a pandemic was not what our Guatemalan partners at the Asturias Academy (AA) had in mind, but they have persevered under adverse conditions: a severe national lockdown that resulted in school families already on the edge experiencing hunger and hardship; remote instruction for the last six months of the school year when many students did not have reliable internet access; and most parents being unable to pay their children's reduced tuition due to loss of employment and income. Despite these obstacles, our friends have been resourceful and creative as always and managed to fulfill their educational mission. Jorge Chojolán reports that they began the school year in January with 215 students, 55% female and 45% male. After about two and a half months of normal instruction, the COVID-19 shutdown necessitated an immediate switch to remote instruction for the remainder of the year. Only 45% of students were able to regularly attend online classes via Google Classroom, another 30% attended once or twice per month or per week, and another 25% did not have any access to online instruction. Teachers and staff underwent a crash course in online instruction and prepared instructional packets that they delivered to students' homes. By the end of the year, only five students had to withdraw from school, and 99% of the remaining students passed and will move on to the next grade.

In addition to accomplishing their educational mission, our Guatemalan partners also provided invaluable health services at the school through the medical and dental clinics of Jorge and Verónica's two oldest daughters, Laura and Paty. They offered the HPV vaccination to all the girls between the ages of ten and fifteen, all students were treated for parasites, 45 students received dental treatments, 98 received medical treatment, as did 53 mothers of students. The school also received financial assistance from a non-governmental organization named Girl Rising to purchase and distribute large food baskets to 50 of the neediest families during the worst part of the shutdown.

We had to cancel this past summer's volunteer delegations, but thanks to generous donations of some or all of the trip deposits that participants had made, in addition to a few other contributions, we were able to send \$10,000 to the AA. This, combined with the tapping of some of the school's limited endowment funds, enabled them to pay their teachers and staff, since most families were unable to make their monthly tuition payments. The vast majority of the school's students are on at least a half scholarship, but even with the Guatemalan economy's reopening and many parents resuming tuition payments, Jorge indicates that as of early November, 55% of families are still unable to pay tuition fees, and sadly, three parents have died of COVID-19 during the pandemic.

For the upcoming academic year that begins in early January, it is clear that Guatemalan schools will still be operating under a hybrid educational model. In order to do so at the school, the Asturias Academy's teachers and staff have designed a plan to be able to combine in-class and synchronous remote instruction for their students. The total budget for the plan, \$9,300, will enable the school to purchase and install 12 computers in classrooms and upgrade their network and internet bandwidth to support simultaneous transmission during the school day.

Nearly 90% of our partner school's students come from low-income families, and without scholarship assistance, they would be unable to experience the life-changing education offered at the school. Tuition payments make up less than half of the \$120,000 annual operating budget that covers all the operating expenses of a pre-K through grade 11 education for over 200 students. That is only about \$50 a month to pay all the educational expenses for each student at the school!

In order to continue empowering Guatemalan youth to break the cycle of poverty and to build a more just and inclusive society, in the midst of the ongoing global health crisis, the Asturias Academy needs our support. As you consider year-end charitable contributions, remember that your monetary gift will have an extraordinary impact at the school. How many

organizations can say that virtually 100% of donations go directly to program expenses? For only \$50 per month, under \$2 a day, you can provide a deserving child a full scholarship that covers tuition, all necessary school supplies, and a school uniform. A half scholarship costs less than \$1 per day, but any amount you can contribute will go a long way toward helping our partners accomplish their worthy mission.

Included below is the necessary information if you would prefer to mail your contribution. In addition to the remote instruction proposal mentioned above, the school's priorities continue to be student scholarships, funds to build an endowment and improve teachers' salaries, and undesignated funds to be able to respond to general operating expenses and occasional unexpected, urgent needs.

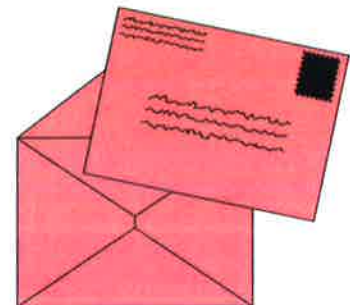
