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From the Pastor's Desk



"If you had to summarize it in a sentence, you could say that the history of private life is a history of getting comfortable slowly. Until the eighteenth century, the idea of having comfort at home was so unfamiliar that no word existed for the condition. Comfortable meant merely "capable of being consoled." Comfort was something you gave to the wounded or distressed. The first person to use the

word in its modern sense was the writer Horace Walpole, who remarked in a letter to a friend in 1770 that a certain Mrs. White was looking after him well and making him "as comfortable as is possible." By the early nineteenth century, everyone was talking about having a comfortable home or enjoying a comfortable living, but before Walpole's day no one did."

Getting comfortable slowly. This phrase connects for me - about home and about Advent. We have lived in *our* home for almost 4 years now - and I am still working on the things that make it comfortable for our family and for anyone who visits. I have a running list of "improvements" that I am slowly working on: a mirror for the guest room, good space for each child to do homework, a better system for storing craft supplies, hooks to hang the backpacks on, the seating arrangement in the living room. It is our home - I love it and the people who share it - but it's not done. It's still a work in progress. I am getting comfortable there slowly.

In reflecting on our worship theme, *Close to Home*, Anna Strickland from *A Sanctified Art* writes, "Our home is never finished because home isn't a destination. It's where life happens. It's about the pets buried in the backyard and the pencil marks on the kitchen wall showing how tall the kids have grown. It's about the meals we've shared at the table, whether birthday celebrations or casseroles to comfort our grief. Home is where we live out the whole tapestry of human existence, good and bad, mundane and extraordinary, trivial and overwhelming."

Advent is a season where we yearn for God to come close, even as we celebrate that God already has. We long for God to draw near again....and again...and again. It is not all "merry and bright" - the whole tapestry of life is here - the grief, longing, hope, peace, heartache, joy, and love. We hope you will fully engage all that we have planned on this journey to and from and in God's welcoming home for us. Even in the places where you must get comfortable slowly.

COVID Response Team Update

Dear Stone Church family,

It's been a while since we sent out an update from the COVID Response team. We continue to meet weekly to review data in the region and develop safe protocols for upcoming events and use of the facility. Below

are some of the most common questions we have been hearing.

Are our protocols working?

Yes! As far as we can tell, there has been no COVID transmission during a church event. We have had COVID positive participants at church services, indicating both that the protocols are working, and that we need to keep them in place.


Our policies currently focus on protecting the most vulnerable in the community – those who are immunocompromised or cannot be vaccinated. Therefore, we follow CDC protocols for unvaccinated groups, focusing primarily on spacing and masking.

Are community groups allowed to use our facilities?

Yes, if the use fits within our safe use policies. For example, users must mask, groups in the Fellowship Hall are limited to 30 people, and we do not allow meals in the facility. Policies for outside users are the same as those for our own members.

Will we ever sing in church again?

Yes! Congregational singing has not gone away forever. Unfortunately, studies show that singing is a really good way to spread the virus. For now, we will continue to just listen, or Zoom in from home and sing loudly. And continue looking forward to the day we can sing together. When will that be? See the next question...



When do things go back to normal?

We've had some really positive changes during the pandemic. For example, the hybrid model of church allows us to hear voices from across the county (or globe!) as well as letting people participate from home for many good reasons. This isn't going to go back to the old way. But we're missing a lot too – such as hugs, singing, congregational meals. Things that we will go back to when it is safe.

I wish we could tell you when and how we will be able to call the pandemic over. But things keep changing in ways we can't predict, so we keep coming to the same conclusion: it's not over yet. In good news, we did not need to close the church facility, even as cases increased in September. Unfortunately, cases remain high enough that masking and distancing remain a critical part of our safety plan. Things we are watching include vaccine availability for every age and low case rates in the county.

Most of all – we want to say thank you. Thank you for continuing to prioritize health and safety, thank you for masking and distancing, and thank you for making the in-person church experience safe and welcoming. Response to the COVID pandemic has been divisive for so many communities. Instead of feeling divided, our committee and the pastors and staff have felt supported and encouraged by you and the sacrifices you are willing to take to keep our community safe. Thank you.

There's been so much trouble in the world, the nation, and my personal life in the recent past that it was hard to get even a small grin or get writing, but a friend came to my rescue when writer's block struck as I thought about December's Jottings. I had wanted to write about Jesus's birthday. The Bible does not tell us when Jesus was born, but it tells us a lot about Easter and Jesus' Resurrection. My friend suggested that, because of all the trouble we've had recently, I concentrate on the Hope his life gives us as well!

Millions of people around the world believe that Christmas is the birthday celebration of Jesus. The Bible does not mention birthday celebrations for Jesus. Celebrating Christmas was first mentioned in the Chronograph of Philocalus, a Roman almanac dated to 336 of the Christian Era.

And in that region there were shepherds out with their sheep in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. And an angel of the Lord appeared to them and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were filled with fear. And the angel said to them, "Be not afraid; for behold, I bring you good news of a great joy which will come to all the people; for to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior who is Christ the Lord. And this will be a sign for you: you will find a babe wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger." (From Luke 2)

Now, if the shepherds were out in their fields and Jesus was born in December, Biblical scholars point out the shepherds were out in the coldest months of the year, Chislev and Tebeth. (November to January). Caesar Augustus probably ordered his census to gather information for purposes connected with taxation and military conscription. To comply with the order, Mary, despite being heavy with child, accompanied her husband Joseph, on the journey of some 90 miles from Nazareth to Bethlehem. Now think about it: Does it seem likely that Augustus-a ruler who rarely interfered with local government-would require a people who were already inclined to revolt to make such a long trip in the winter?

Hundreds of years after Jesus death, December 25 was chosen as the date of his birth. Why? Numerous historians believe that the time of year that became the Christmas season was actually a period when pagan festivities were celebrated. For instance, Encyclopedia Britannica states: "One widespread explanation of the origin of this date is that December 25 was a Christianizing of the *dies solis invicta nati* (day of the birth of the unconquered sun). It was a popular holiday in the Roman Empire that celebrated the winter solstice as a symbol of the resurgence of the sun, the casting away of the winter, and the heralding of the rebirth of spring and summer."

Christmas teaches us about hope and optimism, and here are just a few of the ways Christmas teaches me of hope and fills me with optimism. An epiphany refers to a sudden realization about the meaning of something. It usually feels inspired-from an intuitive place that is charged with wisdom. For Christians, the Epiphany is associated with the visit of the Wise Men to Jesus.

I give thanks to God always for you because of the grace of God which was given you in Christ Jesus, that in every way you were enriched in him with all speech and all knowledge-even as the testimony to Christ was confirmed among you. (from I Corinthians 1)

Christmas season is a reminder of Hope. For many, the Christmas season is about parties, gifts, decorations, and time off work. For Christians, however, this time of year is a happy reminder of the hope we have because of Jesus Christ. "May your unfailing love rest upon us, O Lord, even as we put our hope in you." (from Psalm 33)

Lord thank you that You sent your Son, so that we may have a reason to celebrate . We want to rejoice with You this year by honoring the birth of Christ. Help us to give freely as You freely gave. We praise You and give You all glory and honor. In Jesus' name, Amen.

May this festive season sparkle and shine, may all of your wishes and dreams come true, and may you feel this happiness all year round. May the divinity and purity of Christmas and the New Year festivals make your life holy and meaningful. May the closeness of friends, the comfort of home, and the unity of our nation, renew your spirits this festive season. May the melody and spirit of the holidays fill your home with love and peace all year long. To my special ones, my family, and all who read this - I wish you Happy Holidays, Merry Christmas, and Happy New Year 2022.
