From the Pastor's Desk

Ben and I have a rule - we must get one another's permission before we tell a story about the other in a sermon or newsletter article. And there are often layers to the permission being given - particular ways that the story must be told - usually to protect the innocent. Ben loves to tell a story about me getting in trouble for talking during church as a child. But he likes to exaggerate how many times I had to be punished before learning my lesson, so there are often negotiations on how this one gets told. Telling our history

through storytelling has always meant that there is a slant to how events are related and interpreted. This also means there is a slant to the lessons we learn - or don't learn from the stories we tell. Knowing this is empowering.

The Biblical storytellers were no different. The slant is always toward the people of Israel. Even in the places where there is radical inclusion for all people or a flipping of who is on the outside and who is on the inside, Israel is central to God's unfolding story in the Bible. God's promise to Abraham in Genesis is that Abraham will be the father of a great nation and that nation will be blessed so that it can be a blessing. And yet, the Biblical writers do not give us perfect heroes. They may write with slant, but they do not shy away from the flawed nature of the people of God.

In July, we are beginning a worship series called, *Family Trees*, that will look at these very imperfect humans with whom God has chosen to partner and bless. Abraham, Sarah, and the generations that follow will make choices that hurt each other, that are selfish, and that impact entire nations of people. They will also learn and show grace. They will grow. From these people and stories, the nation of Israel grows. These are the tales that shape it and root it, that give it - and us - direction even now.

It can be difficult to look back on these complicated and painful stories with clear eyes - to not shy away from the intricate layers in the events. It can also be really helpful. In July, on Independence Day, we also look back on the beginning of our nation - the United States. It is a history told with slant. Now more than ever, we need to look at the stories we tell with clear eyes - acknowledging intricate layers and flawed "heroes" - so that we can help shape the unfolding of who we are into a people who do not settle for an unjust society, who are unafraid to disrupt the status quo for the cause of peace, who are compelled by faithfulness and love rather than power, greed, or prestige.

Maya Angelou said, "Do the best you can until you know better. Then when you know better, do better." I believe we can do better. I believe we can keep learning - there is so much more to know. And I think wrestling honestly with these stories, with our roots, with the slant of history can help. I look forward to humbly and vulnerably walking alongside you as we continue to learn - show grace - and grow.

Stone Church Leadership Team Meeting "Continuing the work of Jesus. Peacefully. Simply. Together."



Is it worth the risk? A hard question at the best of times, and now even harder than ever. In chemistry, we use a process called risk assessment. This includes evaluating both the probability of a negative event occurring and also the magnitude of the impacts. For example, how likely is it that someone will be exposed to a chemical and how toxic is the chemical? In the end, though, there has to be a value judgement — is it worth the risk? The Leadership Team and COVID-19 Response Team are going through a similar process as we try to discern our path forward.

I thought, when we first created the COVID-19 Response Team, that this would be a fairly easy task. See what others are doing, look to the CDC for protocols, no problem. I could not have been more wrong. Our decisions are impacting your physical, mental, and emotional health, and I and the rest of the committee feel the tremendous weight of that responsibility.

The Leadership Team and the Response Team both feel very strongly our responsibility to protect the physical health of members of our church family, including the congregation, pastors, staff, and especially the most vulnerable in our community. We have chosen to move conservatively because of our deep love for each of you. However, we also understand the importance of mental health and the desire to be with one another. To make the best possible decisions we read CDC recommendations, recent studies, and guidelines from our own District Executive and other denominations.

With all this information in mind, at each meeting we ask: what are the most important needs and ministries? How are those being met without physically meeting? How would meeting physically change the ministry? Is it worth the risk?

You've hopefully already seen our update on the Friday Flash – the first phase of opening (Mt. Sinai phase) will begin on July 10th only if Huntingdon County is in the green phase and there have been less than 10 cases in the previous two weeks. The Mt. Sinai phase still only allows small groups to gather in the sanctuary if there is a compelling reason, for example, for a wedding or memorial service.

You may be wondering — why wait a month? There are two main reasons. First, we want to see the impacts of reduced restrictions on the number of cases. Will cases go up or remain steady in the county? Secondly, there is a lot to prepare. Protocols need to be written that cover everything from distancing and masks to frequency of cleaning. Cleaning and sanitizing supplies need to be purchased. The HVAC and water will need to be run before the first use because of risk of mold and Legionnaires disease. This month will give us time to get ready.

You may also be wondering why this first phase is still so restrictive. After all, some congregations are actually back to meeting in their church. We have chosen not to take this step in part because of the additional risk, and in part because we would not be coming back to the type of service we know and love even if we are in the sanctuary. Pews would be roped off to keep family units at least 6 feet apart. Everyone would be wearing masks and there would be no singing. There would be no hugs, no handshakes, and no passing the offering plate. The pews would be stripped of hymnals, welcome pads, and anything else that could pass along germs. There would be a clear pathway laid out for travel to a pew, and we would be dismissed slowly at the end of the service so we would not get too close

together. No lingering in the aisles and chatting or greeting the pastor on the way out. Those who are high risk (over 60 or immunocompromised) would be encouraged to stay home. For the present, we can be closer in many ways over Zoom than we can be in the same building. So we have decided that, for now, no – it is not worth the risk.

It's easy to forget that COVID-19 is extremely contagious, has the potential to be deadly, and that it takes some infected individuals months to recover with lingering side effects. And although we can identify those most at risk, all of us, at any age and any health are at risk. When it comes time to make these decisions I sometimes picture those who were often in pews near me. Bill Peters. Jerri and Dean Wenger. The energetic and so often smiling Everett, Cyrus and Ezra. Am I willing to risk their health, their lives, for the benefit of being in our building?

And so we will continue to move slowly and cautiously, and connect electronically instead of physically. The journey to the Promised Land will be slow (although hopefully not forty years...©). Please – stay patient, stay safe, and keep reaching out (virtually) to give or receive help from those around you.

From our Finance Team...

We feel blessed to be able to report on the continued financial support of the Stone Church mission, despite the challenges associated with COVID-19. Through the end of May 2020, giving totaled \$121,625 (which is about 42% of the annual budget for giving). Expenses for the year so far are at \$114,364 (or about 40% of the annual budget for expenses). Five months represents 42% of the year, so we are on track with our budget.




Our congregation approved a balanced budget for 2020; but to do that called for us to make some challenging reductions, particularly in the area of Witness. Our hope is that giving will exceed the budget and enable us to restore some or all of the Witness outreach; as this aspect of our shared mission is something we all value.

Stone Church Responds to Community Needs

Members of the Stone Church responded with speedy generosity this past month to the special needs of our Huntingdon community caused by the onetwo punch of, first the loss of employment from the COVID 19 pandemic, and then by the devastating fire that took the historic Blair Building.



Responding to a "5 for Food" appeal from the Witness Team, members contributed \$4375.00 dollars to purchase 75 grocery cards for the Huntingdon Area Food Bank. The cards will be used to help restock the shelves of the food bank and will to go to several families that have been hit especially hard by layoffs caused by the virus. In a note of thanks to Stone Church, Jean Feagley, the food bank coordinator, said that she had "three or four families" that would be greatly helped by the "extra food supplies."

Because the cards were purchased through the grocery card program, shepherded by Barb Purdy and Cheryl Ritchey, a contribution of more than \$200.00 will come to Stone Church from the Weiss and Giant markets.

The food bank will also use some of the grocery cards to help families made homeless as a result of the Blair Building fire. In addition, Stone Church has sent \$3,576.00 to the Salvation Army which, according to Captain Charity Bender, will be a great help in assisting families in replacing lost items and dealing with the expense of temporary housing. Nearly one fifth of the funds raised by the Salvation Army, for fire victims, came from Stone Church.

Counting some funds that have not yet been disbursed, Stone Church has raised \$8,721.00 in recent weeks to provide relief for members of our community that have endured special hardships. The Witness Team sends you a heartfelt, warm "Thank You."




