From the Pastor's Desk

I've always loved the funny pages. Ever since I was a kid, when the newspaper came, the first place I'd turn was to the comics - to read the latest adventures of Snoopy and Garfield. But my favorite comic strip has always been Calvin & Hobbes. I remember one of the Sunday strips - a big picture, in color. The comic was divided into 20 little squares. The whole thing was one big summer day - each panel showing a different activity.

Eating cereal while reading the funny papers. Digging for buried treasure. Swimming in the pool. Finding bugs under rocks. Cloud watching. Climbing trees. Throwing water balloons. Catching fireflies. Until finally Calvin's mom drags him back inside. Tucked into bed, Calvin leans over and says to Hobbes, "Summer days are supposed to be longer, but they sure seem short to me."

"I'll say," Hobbes replies. "We didn't get to do half our itinerary!"

That's how I remember summers growing up. The days just full of adventures. This summer is no different here at Stone Church.

There's a lot happening this summer. First, we are welcoming Ministry Summer Service Intern **Connor Ladd** to join us for 10 weeks, from early June - August. Connor is a student at Manchester University who is exploring God's call on his life to be a pastor. This is a program that was incredibly formative to Cindy as she was discovering God's call for her. While Connor's here, he will get to experience life in ministry - providing pastoral care, planning worship, teaching Sunday School, preaching, and more. Part of that experience involves him getting to know you and experience life in this community as part of Stone Church. We hope you'll *invite him over to share a meal* (see the note later in this newsletter on how to sign up!), or take him out to Raystown Lake or another favorite local spot!

This summer's **Annual Conference** in Greensboro, North Carolina finds the Church of the Brethren seeking out a "compelling vision" for the church. It's a unique experience, suspending regular business to try to discover together who we are and who God is calling us to become. We'll gather together as a church family on **July 14th** for a **picnic at Raystown Lake** to recap and debrief it all.

In worship here at Stone Church, we'll be exploring the lives of important **Women of the Bible** - from Hagar to the Hebrew Midwives, Ruth, and Esther. We'll also have a series on *Lament* - reading the Bible's "counter-testimony" in Psalms, Ecclesiastes, and Job - reflecting on experiences we all know, of times when God felt hidden, or even unjust. **Sunday School** will continue, giving us a chance to dialogue back and forth on the Scriptures - to understand them better together.

There are so many opportunities to be together. Join us for Lemonade on the Lawn after worship, or come together with your church friends to watch the Altoona Curve baseball game on June 30th. The summer is full. There's not time "to do half [the things on] our itinerary!" If you're like us, you'll be spending some time at Camp Blue Diamond, and maybe traveling with family and friends at points. We hope you'll stay connected. Read the Friday Flash each week, wherever you are, and stay in prayer for your brothers and sisters. Take the time to have someone over from the church - someone you haven't connected with before. Share a meal and hear each other's stories. Join us for worship and Sunday School. Share your stories, let us know the places where you've seen God at work. Because wherever you go, God is there. Psalm 139 puts it like this:

If I take the wings of the dawn, and settle at the farthest limits of the sea,

Even there your hand shall lead me, and your right hand shall hold me fast.

Stone Church will again attend an Altoona Curve game! Join us on Sunday, June 30 at 6pm



From the Moderator, Donita Keister:

As we gather in Greensboro to "Proclaim Christ, Reclaim Passion", business sessions will feel different to conference-goers. Worship, Bible study, and conversations designed to help us discern God's call for us as the body of Christ will be the focus of the business agenda. In 2017, the delegate body affirmed the assertion of denominational and district leadership that "to stay on the journey together, it is also crucial that the church discern the compelling vision that this body of Christ is called to pursue." As a result, in 2018, the delegate body voted to set aside all new business in 2019 to free up time to focus on discerning a vision for the Church of the Brethren. The discernment process, launched at Annual Conference in 2018, continued throughout the year with conversations in districts and with various constituency groups. Rather than a forum to discuss a single issue, the Compelling Vision Process was designed to encourage balanced conversation around three basic areas of visioning:

- How congregations are serving and ministering in and through their life together, helping us understand what is important to congregations and how we might better equip and support one another as we embrace our common passions for ministry in our local settings.
- How we can better come together as many congregations, joining hands to engage in mission and ministry that is bigger than one congregation can accomplish on its own.
- How we can transform and better manage the division and conflict that has been a barrier to our full effectiveness in ministry as the Church of the Brethren.

Discernment around these issues will continue at Annual Conference this year as we seek to deepen the conversation based on what we have heard throughout the last year. Both delegates and non-delegates will have the opportunity to sit with brothers and sisters around tables, engaging in worship, Bible study, and conversation as we seek to discern God's call for us and reclaim our passion to engage in ministry together.

Note: the Compelling Vision process is not intended or designed to 'test', directly or indirecty, the desire of the body to maintain, change, or establish any particular official position/statement of the Annual Conference. Rather we seek to understand: Where are we united? Where can we build a bridge? Where do we need other options for a way forward outside our current framework? Over all, we hope to ultimately answer this most important question: How can we best strengthen the mission of Christ in our congregations...in our communities...in the world? Working to answer this overarching question will help lead us to a compelling vision to be considered at the 2020 Annual Conference when the delegate body deliberates over the final product of the compelling vision process.

Gene's Jottings

Holy! Holy! Holy! Written by Reginald Heber (1783-1826)

Reginald Heber loved preaching in a church in the sleepy town of Hodnet, Shropshire in England. Though from a well-to-do family and educated at Oxford, he preferred a simple life. Dissatisfied with the music in the Church of England, he wrote hymns for his little church. "The time is not right for the singing of hymns in the Established Church," the Bishop of London told him. So Heber packed his hymns away in an old family trunk.

In 1823, Heber became a bishop and was called by his superiors to leave Hodnet to serve in India. Reluctantly, but obediently, he served there for three long and strenuous years. At age 43, he died after preaching to a large crowd at Trichinopoly under the blistering hot sun.

His hymns were discovered later. "Holy! Holy! Holy!" had been prepared for Trinity Sunday, the eighth Sunday following Easter. In this hymn, Heber wanted to honor the Trinity -- Father, Son, and Holy Ghost. "Holy! Holy! Lord God Almighty, Early in the morning, Our song shall rise to thee. Holy! Holy! Merciful and mighty. God in three persons. Blessed Trinity."



May 18, 2019 **Dr. Harriet B. Kaylor**presented with the Honorary Degree of Humane Letters Honoris Causa.

Excerpted from Commencement Remarks by Daniel Welliver, Juniata College professor of Sociology:

Harriet Kaylor is a retired public school teacher who is well known for her insistence on proper English usage and grammar. In fact, for a brief time in the early 1960s, Harriet was an instructor in the Writing Program here at Juniata College. She will not hesitate to point out one's

grammatical error aloud, in front of others, in any time, or in any place, so I am going to be very careful in delivering my remarks this morning.

Working closely with Harriet over the last 10 years, I have learned that she is just as direct and determined in addressing injustice as she is in the eradication of the dangling participle. She conveys her insistence on justice with grace and tact, yet her demand for justice is always clear, and it is persistent. Harriet's energy and spirit for justice work are infectious, inviting others into territories that they may never have imagined they would ever explore.

For me, and for many others, that territory was the inside of a state prison. Talk to any of the volunteer members of the local chapter of the Prison Society that Harriet led for over 24 years. Ask them how they became engaged in advocacy work that led them to correspond with and visit people incarcerated in our two nearby state prisons. They will all credit Harriet with inviting them and supporting them as they took their first tentative steps toward those prison walls.

When I first showed interest in this work, Harriet gently invited me to join her on a visit to the Huntingdon State Correctional Institution. We attended a meeting of the Huntingdon Chapter of the Pennsylvania Lifers Association, an education and advocacy organization within the prison whose members and organizational leaders are men incarcerated for life without parole. The leaders of the Lifers Association offered these words to honor Harriet today: "Dr. Kaylor has become family to us and has shown a willing devotion towards helping people. She is an institution of nobility for all of us." Did you hear that? … an institution of nobility.

The small seedling of an interest in prison-related justice work that Harriet planted in me has grown. The *Inside-Out* initiative joins outside students from Juniata's campus with incarcerated inside students within nearby prisons for college courses taught within the prison walls. All of this was made possible for me—and for many others—by Harriet's initial invitation and her constant encouragement and support. Thanks to Harriet, hundreds of Juniata students have moved within prison walls for college courses, semester-long internships, meetings with prison administrators, single-day educational events, and even to bring live orchestral and choral music into spaces of concrete and steel, and into the hearts of prison staff members and inmates. In these ways, Harriet has contributed directly and profoundly to the mission of the College to "empower our students to develop the skills, knowledge, and values that lead to a fulfilling life of service and ethical leadership."

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. spoke of the long arc of the moral universe that bends toward justice. Harriet Kaylor is a force in that moral universe that has moved us all closer to justice. She is not only a voice for love, compassion, and justice. She *embodies* love, compassion, and justice in her character and in her actions. One needs only to witness Harriet's life and work to realize that she is a teacher for all who encounter her.
