### From the Pastor's Desk

Friday is cinnamon roll day. The whole family looks forward to it every week. On Friday mornings we run upstairs and everybody pitches in to make the cinnamon rolls. We wait expectantly while the aroma wafts from the oven. And when the timer goes off there is a race to add the frosting - which we of course sample when we're done spreading it out.

Everybody picks out the one that looks best to them and we dive in.

It's our new tradition. Cindy started picking up a container of those ready-to-bake cinnamon rolls each week from the grocery store for a little treat as we approach the weekend. It has ended up being part of the rhythm of our week, something that helps set one day apart from the next as we live in this strange era of "social-distancing". Some of our friends do "Waffles & LEGOs" on Saturdays. You probably have a few new traditions of your own.

These rhythms give structure to our lives, they help us make sense of it. We've developed new rhythms of life together as a church too. We still gather faithfully for **Worship** each week on **Sunday mornings**. We just gather together from our own homes now. Many of you join us before the service for a time of fellowship, catching up on one another's lives. We've added the mid-week rhythm of **Wednesday Night Bible Studies** too.

Over the next few weeks, we will continue our series on *Everyday Holiness*, drawing from themes raised in Tish Harrison Warren's book, *Liturgy of the Ordinary*. We'll look at ways that even the most ordinary rhythms of our lives: from *eating leftovers* to *drinking tea* are invested with the sacred and can point us toward life with God, and being the community of faith we are called to be. As Elizabeth Barret Browning put it:

"All earth is crammed with heaven, and every bush aflame. But only those who see take off their shoes..."

The church isn't closed. The whole earth is crammed with the wondrous work of God all around us. God's work in and through this Stone Church family, never stopped. This has been a season filled with its own unique experiences - and with its own unique blessings. We are grateful for you - so grateful that we get to do life together with you in the midst of these strange times.

## Stone Church Leadership Team Meeting "Continuing the work of Jesus. Peacefully. Simply. Together."

Every year for Memorial Day, we pack up the car and head out to Illinois for family camp at Camp Emmaus, that region's version of Camp Blue Diamond. There we spend the weekend visiting Chuck's mom, brothers and friends. We do the same things every year — cook hot dogs, fish in the "lake" (pond), sit around the fire and talk, and watch John Royer fly a toy plane or drone and get it stuck in a tree. As Memorial Day approaches, these unsolicited memories fill my mind. My mind, heart and body know it is the season for this trip. Only this year, we won't be going.

You may feel the same way about the rhythms and seasons of your life. Part of this may have been the weekly pattern of getting ready and heading to church, greeting friends, hearing the choir, and exchanging handshakes and hugs with the pastors on the way out. Many of us are longing for a "return to normal".

Jeff Decker, our Leadership team chair, has been forwarding us guidance and information from our District Executive. As I read through that guidance before our meeting it became painfully apparent that "normal" will look very different even when we can gather in the sanctuary together again. Masks will be normal, handshakes will not. Sermons and prayer are safe, but singing and passing the offering plate are now high risk activities. Worst of all, opening too soon or failing to take precautions may have fatal consequences for loved ones in our church family.

It was clear, as we went through the Leadership team meeting, that planning is going to be critical. Great things are happening right now under the stay at home order — Deacons are working hard to support and stay in touch with the church community, Witness team is actively supporting those in greatest need, and Worship team is already thinking ahead to how we can continue to use video technology when some of us are back in the sanctuary. But how will we open? When? What will it look like? What cleaning and safety protocols do we need?

To work on these questions, your Leadership team has appointed a COVID-19 response team including the pastors, Daisy Decker, Marty Keeney, Brooke Meadows, Luke Roth, and Sharon Yohn. Our task will be to outline the phased reopening of facilities and gathering, and determine what precautions will need to be taken. The good news is that there are excellent recommendations available from our District Executive, the CDC, and other resources.

So many of us long for life to return to normal. To embrace our weekly patterns, seasonal traditions and just to give a friend a hug. But now, more than ever, we need to continue to prioritize the health and safety of the most vulnerable. To embrace our new patterns and find joy in modified traditions. The response team will be working to envision how church activities may feel the same but look different while we all cope with our own personal changing traditions. So this year, while we can't travel to Illinois for Memorial Day, we can make a campfire at home, roast hot dogs, Zoom with friends, and maybe, just for tradition, get a toy drone stuck in a tree.

Because we could not meet this year, this year's Annual Conference theme, program, business, and featured leadership will take place June 30-July 4, 2021 in Greensboro, N.C.



#### **Guatemala Circle Update – June 2020**

Greetings from our Guatemala partners at the Asturias Academy! There's an old saying that "When the United States catches cold, Latin America gets pneumonia," and that adage is proving to be tragically accurate in many ways for the Guatemalan people. While the COVID-19 pandemic has revealed that our social safety

net here in the U.S. is much more frayed than we thought, at least our government and health care system have the resources to provide relief to most who find themselves unemployed and in need of medical treatment. That is sadly not the case in Guatemala.

At present (May 19<sup>th</sup>), Guatemala has only reported 2,001 cases and 38 deaths, although that number is surely low because only very limited testing has been done. The government has imposed strict measures such as a twelve-hour per day curfew from 4:00pm to 4:00am to attempt to limit the spread of the coronavirus. The problem, though, is that a large percentage of the population lives in poverty conditions and cannot afford to shelter in place. There has been a recent spike in cases and the Guatemalan president actually recommended to citizens already suffering from malnutrition that they fast in response to food shortages and limited access to food, a step down from Marie Antoinette's "let them eat cake" proposal for the poor masses.

Schools have been closed since late March and are not scheduled to reopen until July 1<sup>st</sup>, although it remains to be seen whether conditions will permit them to do so safely at that time. Their regular school year runs from January to October, so the pandemic will have even more disruptive consequences for students there than it has here. Our partners have been training teachers to offer instruction to some students using Google Classroom, but since many of the students do not have internet access, they are unable to participate and many parents who have lost their employment can no longer pay the partial tuition they contribute.

Jorge Chojolán is honoring the school's commitment to pay teachers during the shutdown, but they are running low on resources. If you are in a position to provide financial support for the school, any funds donated will be used to cover teachers' salaries and other operating expenses. Checks should be made out to <u>Stone Church of the Brethren</u>, with <u>Guatemala Partner Relief</u> included on the memo line, and can be mailed to the church, or contributions can also be made through online banking, being sure to designate the funds for Guatemala Partner Relief. *Mil gracias* in advance for any support you can offer our Guatemalan partners and friends!

Dear Stone Church community,

I first came to the Stone Church as a freshman at Juniata who was alone and far away from her hometown and family in southwest Florida. I hadn't felt at home in a church for a long time. But from the very beginning the Stone Church community welcomed me. The first sign of this welcome was the little bookmark that is given out that states that the

Stone Church celebrates everyone, regardless of their identity, background, or current relationship with God. I had yearned for a church like that for years and years.

Growing up, I was raised in extremely conservative evangelical churches, and was told things like "if you believe in the Big Bang you go to hell." I spent my entire childhood fighting against the anti-science leanings of my churches, and when my family began going to more science-accepting churches, and I began to grow aware of my identity as an LGBT+ person, I began to fight for LGBT+ recognition, acceptance, and celebration in the church. I came out at fifteen. I was blessed to have a family who loved me unconditionally, but I yearned to find a church community that did the same, to find a church that really seemed to love others — no matter who or what those others were — with the kind of love that I knew God had for everyone.

I couldn't find that church in southwest Florida; my family pretty much stopped going to church altogether when I was an older teenager. But I found that church in central Pennsylvania right next door to my college. I found that church in the welcome I received the moment I walked in the door of the Stone Church, in the bookmark they gave me that affirmed their celebration and love of others, in former pastor Anna Lisa's friendship and guidance, in current pastors Cindy and Ben's friendship and welcome into their home for Easter lunch and long conversations at Baker, in church services and Bible studies that challenged and grew my faith in directions I never imagined my faith could grow but that I am overjoyed it has, in the many free meals offered by the Stone Church that as a college student I appreciated immensely, in Zoom services and Bible studies that have allowed me to remain a part of the Stone Church community from at home in Florida, and in the presence of God and God's love for everyone, no matter what, that permeates the Stone Church community and everyone I have encountered in it.

I am extremely sad to be leaving the Stone Church community now that I have graduated, but more than that, I am unbelievably grateful. In big and small ways, all of you, even those I haven't had the pleasure of meeting or getting to know, have made an incredible difference in my life, more than I can say. You welcomed me and celebrated me and were truly the hand of God in my life. Thank you all for everything.

"Under the certainty of heaven, all we can be sure of is tomorrow. When yesterday is ours, what more can we ask?" Brother Cadfael spoke these words in *Monk's Hood*. Ellis Peters (pseudonym of the late Edith Pargeter) created this muchbeloved character and used him in a series of twelfth-century murder mysteries.

Cadfael, a Welsh Benedictine monk, lived and worked as an herbalist at the Shrewsbury Abbey of St. Peter and St. Paul, in Shropshire. His duties included ministering to the sick and spending many hours in spiritual contemplation. And through it all he found time to solve murder mysteries. A busy person indeed! One whom I've enjoyed reading about for a number of years.

As for myself, I'm certainly no Brother Cadfael. These days I'm certain of one thing: I've forgotten more than I remember. No joking, I'm in earnest here. Right now I'm looking at a newspaper clipping from last year. Its title: "Someday lost memories may be recoverable" by Anthony L. Komaroff, M.D. He believes that when we forget something one day, then remember it later, that suggests "a memory really is still there, but that we just have trouble retrieving it sometimes."

I find that very comforting. And just now I am recalling the last time I visited Mother at the Morrison's Cove Nursing Home. When I walked through the front door into a hallway, the light was shining in my eyes and I could not see the faces in the group seated in the room ahead of me. But I heard Mother's voice! "That's my daughter!" On previous visits she had not seemed to know me. What more can we ask than to be remembered by those we love?





In May, we donated **\$3576** to the Salvation Army, who is organizing housing and support for the victims of May's fire. Our latest update is that Michele Rupert, Soup Kitchen Director, is coordinating providing food/meals to those still displaced. As of Friday, May 22<sup>nd</sup>, there are 10 people housed at Comfort Inn and 15 at the

Motor Inn. A spokesperson for the Salvation Army told us that NO more clothing is needed at this time; noting that this is due to the quick action and generosity of local residents. She also noted that as these 25 people find more permanent living spaces, they will need linens and furniture. Thank you all for your donations and prayers during this time.
