From the Pastor's Desk

On my first day we fixed a toilet. On my second day we mopped up a leak in the attic. At the time, I had no idea how accurate this initial introduction to being a pastor really was! I had signed up for a summer where I could explore what ministry was like just in case I was being called in that direction - and I got more than I bargained for. The program is called Ministry Summer Service. It pairs college students who are interested in ministry with a mentor and sets them free to DO ministry in partnership - using an action-reflection model to learn. Ministry settings include churches, camps, and denominational programs.

It's been 18 years since that summer in Northern Virginia. I'm still in touch with several folks from the church. I talked to my mentor - who is now also a friend - just last week. That summer remains one of the most formative experiences of my life. And I'm pleased to say that we at Stone Church have the opportunity to support and mentor another young person, just like me, this coming summer. Connor Ladd, a sophomore at Manchester University, will be joining us as a Ministry Summer Service intern beginning in June. Pastor Ben will serve as his primary mentor, but all of us have the opportunity to commit to making sure his exploration is meaningful.

Leadership Team has already made the commitment to help the pastors find a way to house and feed him. Witness Team is budgeting a stipend for him. But those are the nuts and bolts - and we will all lose out if those are the only commitments we make. The gifts and graces of this community are abundant. The knowledge, experience, and stories are amazing. We have a lot to share. And some of the easiest things we have to give could be the most meaningful.

When I was an intern, one family made sure I had a fun place to spend July 4th - a picnic by a pond with a whole gaggle of neighbors and friends. Someone else took me canoeing and opened up a conversation about how they discerned their vocation as a teacher. I got treated to so much good food! People talked to me at church, invested in learning to know me, and let me know them too!

I needed my mentor that summer. I don't know what I'd do, even now, without that relationship in my life. I'm so grateful a pastor took the time to mentor me. We all need those people in our lives. But I cannot overstate how important that particular congregation was in forming my experience of what full time ministry can be like. It was a huge gift to be part of a wonderful community. Churches are necessary - whole churches - not just individuals, in the work of discerning a call to the ministry. This Body - Stone Church - has a vital role to play in equipping, supporting, nourishing, and empowering Connor.

So as we prepare, how might you engage in that work? Will you offer a meal? An engaging conversation? An invitation to a family gathering? Will you invest in knowing someone new? And letting yourself be known?

This community is incredible! It is a great place to learn and grow. I can't wait to see how we do it together with this new face....and to learn of the impact further down the road.

Baker Institute for Peace & Conflict Studies hosts

Samuel Munderere

May 2, 7:00 PM at Stone Church



On Thursday, May 2, the Baker Institute for Peace & Conflict Studies will host Rwandan genocide survivors advocate Samuel Munderere for a talk titled "The life of Rwanda genocide survivors 25 years on" beginning 7 PM at Stone Church, in the downstairs gathering space.

Munderere is chief executive of Survivors Fund (SURF) in Kigali, Rwanda, where he has worked for more than 13 years to improve the lives of vulnerable people. He has a profound understanding of the issues facing women and children in Rwanda and extensive experience with programs

that seek to empower them and transform their lives. His expertise is in managing educational and counseling projects, and he has supported 850 youth born of genocidal rape, as well as their mothers. Munderere holds a Master's degree in International Development Management from the University of Westminster (London, UK) and a Bachelor's degree in Social Work and Social Administration from Bugema University.

Munderere's talk will explore how the consequences of the genocide are changing with time, as well as what is being done and needs to be done to support survivors.

Juniata Peace & Conflict Studies student and Rwandan genocide survivor Liliane Pari Umuhoza interned for three consecutive summers with SURF, and will be present as well.

Farmers' Market Bucks Are Back

What are Huntingdon County Farmers' Market Bucks? They're "fake money" that can be used like cash at the Huntingdon and Mount Union farmers' markets. They come in \$1 and \$10 denominations.

Why purchase Market Bucks? To commit...

- to eating more fresh, nutritious, locally-grown food
- to supporting and strengthening the market, its environmentally-responsible farmers and our local economy
- to increasing access to the market for folks who otherwise couldn't afford it
- to enhancing our sense of our community

How will Market Bucks help folks otherwise unable to afford shopping at the market? Donations may be made toward the purchase of Market Bucks for use by persons who get government food assistance (*i.e.* SNAP benefits, formerly known as Food Stamps, now on EBT cards). When folks use their EBT cards at the market, they'll receive \$1 of "Bonus Bucks" (donated Market Bucks) for each \$2 they spend. Additionally, for every \$20 of Market Bucks sold, \$1 in Market Bucks will be given to Huntingdon County PRIDE, for distribution to its elderly clients.

How can one buy Market Bucks and/or make donations to support the "Bonus Bucks" program? Market Bucks purchases and donations may be made using cash or check:

- in the back of the sanctuary following worship (7 April 19 May; see Kim Roth)
- at the Stone Church office Mon-Fri mornings (April through October; see Debbie)
- at the farmers' markets (all season May through October)
- at the PRIDE office, 1301 Mt. Vernon Ave., Huntingdon (Smithfield Twp.), Mon-Fri, 8:30-4:30 (April through October)



Around the Horn with Gene Goshorn!



Death is scary. It always seems to surprise us. Yet, we begin dying the moment we take our first breath at birth. Christianity tells us that, through death, we can gain new life; that, through the pain of life, we can be born again.

After birth, and before death, Christianity teaches us to live a good life. A popular 1949 song, sings about "Ghosts Riders in the Sky,"; ghosts cowboys chasing a herd of the Devil's cows but never catching them:

"Ghosts riders in the sky...their faces gaunt, their eyes were blurred, their shirts all soaked with sweat They're riding hard to catch that herd, but they ain't caught 'em yet. Cause they got to ride forever on that range up in the sky..."

"As the riders loped on by him, he heard one call his name: "If you wanna save your soul from Hell ariding on our range, then, cowboy, change your ways today or with us you will ride trying to catch the Devil's herd across these and less skies."

Trying to catch the Devil tells the story of a prominent sinner whose name you will know.

During a raging storm at sea, slave ship owner, John Newton, feared for his life, and the lives of his crew.

John cried out to God for help. Miraculously, the storm calmed, and John and his crew were spared.

John renounced slavery; left the sea and slaving. John spent the next 16 years preparing for the ministry.

John entered the ministry at age 39. And, while pastor at Olney, England. John wrote, "Amazing Grace,"; his tribute to the loving God who had saved him.

"Amazing grace, how sweet the sound, that saved a wretch like me.

"I once was lost, but now am found; was blind, but now, I see."
