## From the Pastor's Desk

The bedtime routine at our house is a bit chaotic. I try so hard to be "in the moment." I put all sorts of pressure on myself to cherish every cuddle during storytime because one day these boys won't want to sit on my lap while I read to them. I know the days are long and the years are short. But honestly, most of the time it's a competition for who is more tired- me or the kids - which usually triggers bad behavior from all of us. Most nights I feel like it's a win if I don't scream, "Just put on your pajamas for pete's sake!!" (or worse!)

But a few nights ago, Everett pulled me out of my bedtime-stress rut. Ben was at a meeting, so I was trying to get all 3 boys down by myself. This meant that Everett had to spend some time alone in his room while I worked with the twins. When I walked in his room, he immediately said, "Can I show you something?" Somehow I resisted the urge to say, "No, it's already late, we have to go to bed." And said, "Sure." (I may have sighed dramatically, though - I'm only human.)

He was sitting on his bed looking out the window. He patted the bed beside him, told me to come sit with him and said, "Look - there are so many fireflies." I am so glad I sat down with him and looked. There were, indeed, so many fireflies. And I am so grateful that I didn't miss them. They are so fleeting - fireflies and moments of beauty.

As summer inevitably comes to a close - and things begin to gear back up for another school year - I wonder where you are pausing to see beauty. What are the flashes of brilliance or compassion or hope that are lighting up your life? Who are the people in this season who keep inviting you to look with them? To see things differently?

There have been a number of "flashes of light" in our shared life that we celebrate in this season. Our partnership with Juniata College has had some opportunities to flourish as Ben and I met with student orientation leaders and parents of incoming students. We had encouraging visits with alumni at Annual Conference. We had a college student, Madison Miller, invest in our youth - leading a program on love for them this summer. And the college partnered with us in hosting Connor, our MSS intern by providing him with housing for the summer at no cost to us. There are definitely points of light in the midst of this unfolding relationship - certainly places of connection worth looking at with gratitude.

It has been encouraging to explore ministry together with Connor - to have someone ask questions about the ways things are done here, to see growth and learning, to invest in a relationship that can continue to lead to more and more ministry in the world.

It has been a quick summer - chaotic at times - but beautiful too. I hope you'll take time to reflect - even as you look ahead to new opportunities to welcome JC students, new opportunities to engage in learning through Sunday School classes, a new youth program - making a fresh start as fall arrives. There are so many good things to see as the season changes. Here's the thing I discovered while looking for fireflies with Everett: once I sat down and saw the first few, I kept seeing more, until I was seeing them everywhere! I hope that's how the light floods into your lives as you look around - back at the summer about to end and ahead at the new school year beginning. May seeing one bit of hope or bit of light or bit of beauty, open your eyes to that reality all around!

## Finance Team: Mid-Year Update

Through June of 2019 Stone Church giving and other income totalled \$134,380, which is 50% of the amount of income budgeted for the year. Total Expenses through June of 2019 are at \$133,551, 44% of the budgeted expenses. The good news is that income for the first six months exceeded expenses by \$829. This is the result of expenses being under budget by \$17,693. We don't expect expenses to remain this far below budget for the remainder of the year and have faith that congregational support for the inspiring work of Stone Church will keep pace with the needs of our shared mission.

\*Remember that we adopted a budget for 2019 that projected a deficit of \$34,540 (income falling short of expenses by that amount). We did that intentionally with the belief that pledged giving, which for 2019 was lower than actually received in 2018, would strengthen. We also believe that the mission we share requires us to stay the course on spending as we faithfully approach the evolving Stone Church mission.

## Annual Conference 2019 Report

I would first like to thank the congregation for giving me the opportunity to represent Stone Church as a delegate. It was a wonderful opportunity to strengthen my faith through fabulous worship, insightful sessions, and challenges put out by speakers during meals. It was a time to reengage with old acquaintances, enhance relationships with colleagues and meet new and interesting people, which included 5 new congregations! The opportunity to participate in the Compelling Vision process was a blessing. While I could elaborate on each of these, I will concentrate my report on the Compelling Vision process and provide my perspective.

Kudos go out to the leadership, as the whole conference and process was geared to create a safe, trustful and loving exchange of ideas. Several at my table commented that this was the most loving and non-confrontational table they have participated with since the query challenging the 1983 Statement on Human Sexuality. Every facet from preconference delegate preparatory prayer, to sermon messages, to the order of Compelling Vision questions and the reinstatement of Love Feast was purposely orchestrated to reduce antagonist conflict and rhetoric in order to begin a process of reconciliation. While I believe some churches will still exit the denomination, leadership's efforts created more trust, allowing love to flow and voices to be heard.

Upon introductions, we shared hopes for the conference and future. Mine was that the Church of the Brethren remains true to continuing the work of Jesus, peacefully, simply, and **together**. We shared wonderful stories of service in Jesus' name. The hearing of others' great works established appreciation for others, no matter if their persuasion were fundamental, inclusive or centrist. Still, our table facilitator had her work cut out for her. The divide in theology was deep and optimism for togetherness and reconciliation was extremely low. I believe the process at a minimum will allow for amicable separation for some, while many others gained a ray of optimism due to the identified common ground of putting Christ at the center and continuing his work. For those interested in more specifics and detail, the questions posed to the delegates will be posted on the COB website.

My perspective is that the divide remains deep, so much so that code words like "the elephant in the room", "inclusivity" and "sin" are used instead of speaking of it as sexual orientation or homosexuality. The sides hide behind walls built by phrases like "Biblical authority" and "What would Jesus do". What previous annual conference delegates described as argument and hurtful debate began to move in the direction of conversation and dialogue. However, the walls have been built high and strong so we likely need more time and more loving dialogue to move through reconciliation. There is a sense of optimism emerging as this year's discussions began to build trust and reconciliation through Christ, and passion to continue his work.

## **Ministry Journey**

Many of you have asked about my journey towards a possible second career as an Interim Pastor, the genesis of which began when I was Leadership Team Chair and Pastor Dale Dowdy announced his retirement. That time of transition brought with it many prayers and sermon messages relating to endings and new beginnings in Christ. We transitioned to a single pastor, then added an interim; and then Pastor Christy announced her retirement and we transitioned to just an interim pastor and finished the transition phase with the calling of Pastors Ben & Cindy. During this period I learned of the importance and the special responsibilities held by an Interim Pastor as a leader temporarily contracted to help the congregation through transition and prepare them for new leadership. Stone Church was blessed with an excellent Interim in Pastor Anna Lisa Gross. She was an inspiration to me.

Over the years I have shared ministry moments, stories and sermons regarding my faith journey; stories that reflected my own time of transition; moving from the familiar Rick Laabs as you knew him to the birth of a new more faithful and hopefully, more loving Rick Laabs. Each time I shared a story, a message or a reflection with you, I was encouraged to continue sharing. You provided helpful feedback both on my stories and their presentation and I gained confidence through your support.

During this time of spiritual renewal, my back problems worsened and I was faced with the reality that my current career could soon end. I entered a new phase of my life, not knowing if the recommended back surgery would relieve the pain or how long the recovery would be. But I couldn't have been more blessed - my surgery was a miraculous success and my energy and enthusiasm returned. I continued to explore where in ministry my skills and abilities might best apply and met with Pastor Anna Lisa to explore the possibilities. She encouraged me to explore a call to interim pastoral ministry; and while I wasn't ready to abandon my current field of expertise, I did begin to pray and ask God show me the way.

During this time of searching and praying, I prepared for and participated in the COB National Youth Conference. These experiences and following discussions with Dick Landrum, Dave Witkovsky, Pastor Ben, Donna Rhodes and finally Middle PA District Executive Dave Banaszak, brought me to the decision to begin an exploratory journey through the ACTS program offered by SVMC. It's only been a few classes so far but, as I return from Annual Conference, I do believe God is leading me into some form of ministry. I still have a decision to make regarding licensing, as my one year anniversary approaches. I thank you for your continued support, prayers and for all the encouraging words you've offered as I explore my call.

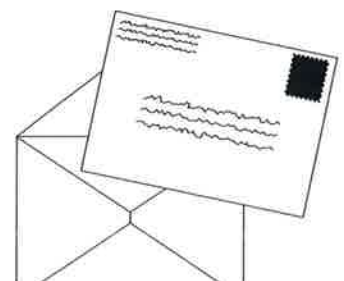

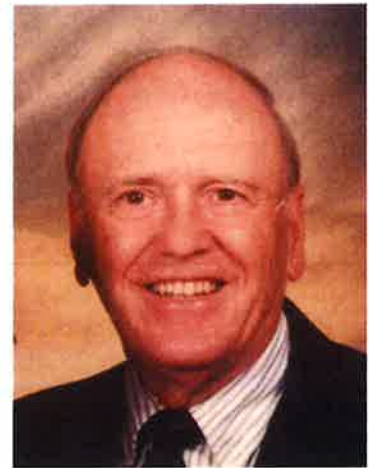

## Remembering Floyd - by Andy Murray

In his later years, after Lois died and after I no longer spent Sunday mornings in the Stone Church choir loft, Floyd McDowell usually sat about two rows behind me, toward the back of the port side of the congregation. We always greeted each other warmly, but I never really told him how much I owed to him; how important he was in shaping the arc of my life.

Because Floyd spent years crisscrossing the country in his beloved Beechcraft Bonanza, separating thrifty Brethren from their money and because he helped manage and invest those gifts with a rare fusion of frugality and imagination, I was able to spend three years in a new, rent controlled, beautifully furnished apartment, located on a manicured campus of lakes, rolling yards and state of the art classrooms. Because of his gentle persistence in challenging congregations and individuals with a vision of quality graduate education for the Church, I was able to study with giants of Biblical and theological education; I was able to be a part of a community of nearly a hundred men and women who were challenged daily to grow in both intellectual and spiritual stature. I was able to translate my love for the church into vocation, without undue concern for what it would cost.

Of course, I was a student and rarely thought about how hard others worked to make life as a student possible. Part of the rich gift of aging is that with somewhat extended vision, we can see how we ride on the shoulders of those that preceded us.

Wheels up, Brother Floyd. We miss you.

In July, the item was cereal and 60 boxes plus 3 cans of vegetables and 1 can of fruit were donated to this local ministry, and \$ 57.00 in cash was donated toward Farmer's Market Bonus Bucks.
