## From the Pastor's Desk



"[My Aunt Deborah] read the Scripture to me like a daily newspaper and I suppose that's the way she thought of it, as something going on happening eternally but always exciting and new. Every Easter, Jesus really rose from the dead, an explosion, expected but nonetheless new. It wasn't two thousand years ago to her; it was now. And she planted something of that in me."

Every year at this time, we tell the story. We tell the story of that terrible wonderful week with all its ups and downs. The triumphal entry with palm branches waving and shouts of "Hosanna!" ringing in the air. Jesus' last supper with his disciples - his friends. Fear and betrayal in the garden. The cross at Golgotha... And then, finally, the empty tomb.

We tell the story - but it's more than that. We don't just remember it; we re-live it, "exciting and new." We wave palm branches in a parade of our own. We gather in the evening to share a meal, sharing the bread and the cup as we look ahead with uncertainty at the future. We stand vigil at the foot of the cross, hearing Jesus' last words again for the first time. We behold with wonder the mystery of the empty tomb.

Even in this strange year, we have the opportunity to re-live the story:

- On **Palm Sunday** we will create our own Parade of giving and celebration. Approximately 10 minutes after Sunday morning worship ends (around 11:47AM), you are invited to bring donations of nonperishable food items to the church. You can drop off your donation at the corner of our property by Stone Church Drive and Moore Street, and then follow our "parade route" collecting a palm branch to wave as you move toward the prayer wall and add prayers, after which you will move around to the 17th street side of the church to pick up supplies for Holy Week including Soup and Communion Bread for our Maundy Thursday service.
- Then on **Maundy Thursday** we will gather over Zoom for our Love Feast at 6pm on April 1. The deacons are providing soup and bread, so that we can truly share this meal, even from our own homes. We will break bread, even as Christ did with his disciples, taking communion together as a family of faith.
- On **Good Friday**, we will join with churches from around our community, in an online service following the seven last words of Jesus. Pastor Ben will be opening the service with a reflection on the first word. We will send out a link once it is available.
- On **Holy Saturday**, we will have a day of service for anyone who wants to participate. Typically we serve one another within this community through feetwashing on Thursday. As we are unable to wash one another's feet, we still want for there to be a way to offer and receive service from each other in community. Please sign up to serve by contacting Pastor Ben. A simple list of ways you might offer kindness and care will be in the Friday Flash.
- And on Easter Sunday, we will celebrate in worship the risen Lord. There will be a Sunrise Service on
  Zoom at 6:46AM. If you are able, take your computer or phone outside to join together in the gathering
  Light. We will celebrate again at our normal worship time on zoom at 10:45AM

Amidst all the challenges of the past year, sometimes the world has felt hopelessly broken. Life with this church family - living the events of this Holy Week together - reminds us that the story isn't finished yet, even when all seems lost.

"The little gray whisper of my Aunt Deborah came to me [on the Saturday between Good Friday and Easter.] 'Of course, Jesus is dead. This is the only day in the world's days when He is dead.... But tomorrow. Just wait until tomorrow. Then you'll see something."

\*This month, in place of an article on the events of leadership team, please enjoy a personal reflection from Sharon Yohn, Chair of the COVID-19 Response Team\*


It's Thursday, March 11, and things are looking up. We've just had warm days, the crocuses are coming up, and we're looking forward to Easter and the events of Holy Week. More and more people are getting vaccinated and it's

starting to feel like an end to this endless physical isolation from friends is in sight. I confess to feelings of freedom, lightness, and a desire to not be all that careful about that pesky virus. Surely the worst danger has passed?

Unfortunately, allowing our emotions – our frustration, impatience, and desire to be with the people we love – to drive our decisions can be a dangerous prospect indeed. While cases are certainly lower than at the start of the New Year, there are still many cases in the county. While the vaccine makes me feel more optimistic, the mere existence of the vaccine does not yet protect those of us who are unvaccinated, and those who are vaccinated can still carry and transmit the virus.

Recent data shows an increase in cases in Huntingdon County, illustrating the need to continue to maintain those precautions of which we have all grown so tired. While some of those new cases are certainly from a recent outbreak in the prison, it is a critical reminder for us to stay cautious, especially as new, more contagious forms of the virus are spreading.

This doesn't mean, however, that we shouldn't embrace the energy and joy that can come from the arrival of spring, the increasing sunlight and the

warmer temperatures! Warm weather makes it easier to be outside, making it safer to be near (but not too near) each other. There continue to be many ways to engage and to be involved with your church community on-line.

We are indeed grateful that many of the most vulnerable in our community have had the opportunity to be protected through vaccination. Now we need to be patient *just a bit longer* until we reach the critical herd immunity and all of us, young and old, can gather without fear. Your COVID-19 response team will continue to monitor the current studies, case numbers, and CDC recommendations to evaluate when and how we can gather safely. We're all tired of waiting, but unfortunately, our time in the COVID wilderness is not yet complete. Fortunately, we are blessed with a supportive and loving community of faith. We may not be able to embrace each other literally yet, but I hope we can continue to embrace each other in faith, support and love.

Program Staff must be at least 18 yrs. old, and maintenance workers must be at least 16. Staff members must be committed Christians, enjoy children and youth, and be able to live in harmony with others. Aside from being fun, working at camp is a great learning experience too. Staff members grow in faith as well as leadership and communication skills. For those interested in teaching, ministry, social work or just being a parent, it's terrific on the job training! Pay is based on experience and ranges from \$200-\$250/week, plus room and board. The camp season for 2021 will be from June 7 - July 31. ### **RV Campground & Cabins**

Need a place for vacation this summer? CBD's campground and the Lakeside and Rising Sun cabins are open. The campground has 44 trailer sites, 2 tent sites and a primitive cabin. All sites include a table, fire ring and water. Both 30- and 50-amp service are available on each site, and a few sites have sewage hook-up. The Washhouse offers toilets, sinks and showers. A dump station, dumpster, firewood and ice are available. Smoking, vaping, alcohol are not allowed, but pets on leashes are. Camp's Family Campground has a family oriented, quiet atmosphere. It is a great place to relax, enjoy nature and have family time. A Wi-Fi hotspot is available in the campground parking lot. A lake and sandy beach are open to guests for swimming and canoeing. Hiking, beach volleyball, biking and fishing are available too.

Both Lakeside and Rising Sun cabin have 3 bedrooms, a living/dining room, kitchen, 2 bathrooms, a loft, central AC and heat, and aTV/DVD. They are handicapped accessible. The kitchen has a refrigerator, microwave, oven, dishwasher, coffeemaker, dishes and pots and pans, making it ideal for family vacations. There are 6 sets of bunk beds in each cabin, with 3 of the bottom beds being doubles. Lakeside and Rising Sun require a 2-night stay, the fee is a minimum of \$156/night (six guests or less). If you spoke German and lived near Shirleysburg in 1802, you could have joined Christian Long, his wife Elizabeth Baker, and two other couples and organized the district's very first Church of the Brethren.

Only 20 years ago, the Aughwick-Germany Valley Church of the Brethren celebrated its bicentennial. And the woman (later to become my wife) Alberta Haught was the speaker. Alberta was the daughter of the 45<sup>th</sup> pastor of the church, from 1957 til 1967, the Rev. Albert M. Haught. Albert later served as Pastor of Visitation at Stone Church.

Preachers Jacob Lutz and Christian Long (who wed Jacob's sister, Catherine) preached in German, which made it difficult to spread the Gospel to the neighboring English. Early worship was held in members' homes, as was the custom. Rooms were provided in members' homes as the homes were built. A nearby school was used for meetings in the early 1830s, when there were 25 members,

A church building 65 by 40 feet costing about \$800 was started in 1836, composed of Blacklog Mountain stone. It was the first Brethren church building in the district.

The church pews were elevated and separated by a solid rail through the center. Boys and men were to sit on the left and the women and girls on the right. The Shirleysburg Herald of 1861 reported: "Dunkard love feast to be held at Germany Valley, to last from 10 a.m. one day until noon the next." In the church attic, reached by winding stairs, were "rope and spool" beds where congregants stayed overnight. Some slept on the church benches. Backs were added to the benches in 1872 when new pews were installed.

\*Love Feast continues to play an important role in our lives together as Brethren and followers of Jesus. It will look very different from that Love Feast our forebears in faith held 150 years ago - but it promises to be very meaningful. We hope you'll join us.\*

# Visit our Lenten Prayer Wall

This Lent, we invite you to come to God in prayer again & again, weaving your prayers in with those of our larger community. Woven together, our prayers form the shape of an ampersand (&), an ancient symbol that, used here, represents God's holy "and."

When we feel helpless and hopeless, God's holy "and" encourages us to lift our weary eyes to search for more. In a culture overrun by extremes, either/or thinking, and polarizing politics, this holy & reminds us that we are always more—that there is always more. We are broken & beautiful. Joy & grief can coexist. Historical, systemic oppression persists & God is guiding us closer to liberation and wholeness.

This Lent, let us practice the power of "and"—especially when "again?!" feels like our never-ending cry of lament. Within the ampersand, our prayers are held together and transformed into beauty. Supplies for the prayer wall are found in your kit AND at the wall itself - along with prompts for prayers. There will also be prayer prompts during Sunday morning worship.



### Holy Saturday - Service Day

One of the rhythms of our congregation is to serve one another on Maundy Thursday by washing each other's feet. We practice the humility and generosity we want to live out in the world on each other. Since we are unable to wash feet this year - we wanted to create a way to serve one another during Holy Week. You can sign up to serve one or two other households in our faith community. The service would be simple and at your convenience - hopefully being completed on or around Holy Saturday (April 3).
