From the Pastor's Desk



There are these stories we tell again and again, year after year, when my family gets together. Like the one about the time I wanted to ride my bike in the road, "like the big people do." Only my "bike" was a tricycle and I was only 3 years old. (A neighbor picked me up out of the *middle* of the street, and brought me home, kicking and screaming, before any cars came by.) Or we tell the story about the time when I was little and my older sister and my parents were up playing UNO after my bedtime. I emerged from my room wearing my pajamas and the saddest face and asked pitifully, "Are you guys playing 'Who-knows' without me?" I just *never wanted to miss out*.

Or we tell about the time Abigail Adams, a long time resident of the State psychiatric institution up the street rang the doorbell on Christmas morning. My mother, ever the welcoming hostess, invited him in and he sat down *and joined my extended family at the table* for Christmas dinner.

We tell these old yarns over and over, even though we know them by heart. We bring these memories out and polish them together, bringing a smile to our faces, before putting them away for a while, until the next gathering. These memories we share, these stories, help us remember who we are. They are *our* stories. They help bind us together...

Every year around this time, we bring out some of the same old stories - tales of hosannas and palm branches, of a last meal and washed feet. We tell the story of the cross, and of the empty tomb. We *re-live* these stories together throughout Holy Week.

- On **Palm Sunday**, April 10th, during worship we will tell the story of the king's entry into Jerusalem. We will celebrate, with a service of baptism and welcoming a dozen new members into our church family!
- On **Maundy Thursday**, April 14th, we will gather in the evening for Love Feast together, remembering Jesus' last supper with his disciples even as we gather for a service of footwashing, fellowship, and communion together.
- On **Good Friday**, April 15th, together with congregations throughout our community, we will take part in the Forum of Churches' service, keeping vigil at the foot of the cross, as we remember Jesus' last words to us.
- On **Easter Sunday Morning**, April 17th, we make our way at sunrise up to the Peace Chapel, for an Easter Sunrise service together with those from other churches to marvel at the mystery of the empty tomb.
- And then, later that morning, we will join together in celebration for Easter Sunday Worship, proclaiming together the good news that Christ is risen through story and song - including the return of our Stone Church choir!¹

So, don't miss out. Come join us at the table. Be a part of re-telling these stories that help us remember who we are - the stories that bind us together.

I love Spring. I love the blooming trees; I love the birds singing; I love how the air feels different. I even love the smell of manure being spread across the fields. For me, Spring brings hope, excitement, and motivation. Spring truly is the start

of new life, both literally and figuratively. So, it is only fitting that on March 20, the official first day of Spring, our congregation was able to come back to life and sing together for the first time in two years. Two years! It is hard to believe it has been two years since our voices echoed in the sanctuary and passersby could hear us rejoice as they walked along the sidewalks. The first day of Spring also brought a different kind of new life back to the church. Young children returned to the nursery, and we could see their smiling faces and hear their laughter. This day was especially meaningful for me because it was the first day that my family was able to return to the church as a family. This form of rebirth for our church is largely the result of the leadership of six individuals – Sharon Yohn, Daisy Decker, Brooke Meadows, Luke Roth, Marty Keeney, and Pastor Cindy Lattimer – also known as the COVID Team.

For two very long and arduous years, our COVID team has worked diligently to keep us all safe. This was not an easy task as new strains of the virus emerged, and the number of cases skyrocketed and then receded only to skyrocket once more. It also wasn't easy when other places of worship around our community and our country were reopening and continuing their typical practices. It wasn't easy to combat the COVID fatigue that most of us were experiencing as we longed for the way things used to be. When making decisions, the COVID Team put the safety and wellbeing of our congregation first. They did not allow for political interference, and they did not present an ultimatum of faith or science. Rather, they recognized that listening to what the data says was the best way to follow Jesus' number one rule — to love one another. With each difficult decision that was made, it was made from the love they have for Stone Church. Not the building, but the people. From the youngest child to the healthy twentysomething to the frailest among us. It was love that guided their deliberations; it was love that guided their decisions; and it is love that continues to guide them. I, for one, am grateful to belong to a community of people who put love first. Thank you to the COVID Team for everything you have done to keep us safe, but most of all, thank you for your love.

Summer Camp 2022 – What's In A Name?



My wife, Alberta, liked to write poems. She wrote one about Johnny Appleseed and won a magazine entry that garnered her Fifteen Dollars...

Our teachers speak of Washington, Sam Adams and the rest.

I'll tell you of the patriot I like the best.

John was born two hundred years ago.

He played among the apple trees that grew there, row on row.

One day he said, "there's something I'd really like to do."

I'd like to plant an apple tree for you and you and you.

In dumplings and in spicy cakes, the apple can't be beat. A wedge of fresh-baked crusty pies, a very special treat. An apple makes the finest sauce; besides it's good for you.

So let us praise John Chapman now. Let's honor him, indeed. And let us all remember him as "Johnny Appleseed."

John was a plain and simple man who preached the gospel of Jesus Christ as he traveled, and during his travels he converted many Native Americans. The Indigenous People regarded him as someone who had been touched by the Great Spirit. During his later life, John was a vegetarian. He never married. He thought he would find his soulmate in heaven if she did not appear to him on Earth.

When we think of the great figures that have truly affected this world, we often consider figures such as Mother Teresa, Mahatma Gandhi, Winston Churchill, Princess Diana, and Pope John Paul II. The list goes on and on. And usually in considering these people who have affected the world, we take into account the things they have done. Mother Teresa sought a culture dedicated to the sanctity of life, promoting the beauty and joy that was serving the poor in disease-ridden streets of India. Mahatma Gandhi fought for peace in his country that he firmly believed would lead to peace throughout the world. Winston Churchill was the face of the British government throughout the turmoil that was the Second World War. Princess Diana used her celebrity to bring attention to the AIDS crisis in Africa. Pope John Paul II was the face and fearless leader of the Roman Catholic Church for twenty-six years, bringing a message of peace, hope, and love.

While we can consider these people great figures, I would like to add two people to the list of wonderful folks who have affected the world. I am sure you thought of the first when I mentioned truly great figures. Another is someone you probably have not thought of since your Walt Disney days. At any rate, they can both be men who made the world better. The first is Jesus, God incarnate, Savior of the world. He influenced and saved the world, and he was the fulfillment of the Old Testament promises. He was perfection and the absolute example of priest, prophet, and king. He came into this world to shake the foundations on which it rested, hoping to bring truth and the wonder that is loving and serving God.

But I say to those nay-sayers, wasn't Jesus considered crazy by the Pharisees, the lawyers of the day? Didn't they say that his claim of raising the temple in three days and "I am the bread of life" were insane? Because of his preaching, they crucified him. Jesus sought truth, revealing to people that he was the Way, Truth, and Life. Johnny Appleseed sought to bring delicious treats in the form of apples, a source of way, truth, and life. Many thought this plain and simple way of sleeping in tree branches with a pot on his head were clear signs Johnny was off his rocker. Likewise, many in Jesus day and today believed his miraculous life to be irrational. All the same, through Jesus' life and teachings, his death and resurrection, we are saved. *Plain and simple*.
