From the Pastor's Desk

That's been true for our society as well in this strange summer of 2020. The upheaval sparked by the murders of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor and others has opened new possibilities as our society has begun wrestling openly with the realities of continuing racism, both personal and systemic. As COVID-19 has upended our normal ways of being, we've started to ask questions about the pace and patterns of life we had taken for granted, forced to imagine new ways of being together.

Most of the New Testament was written to the early church. A minority group that was often persecuted. Much of it was written to give courage and hope to a group that usually found itself on the margins. For most of us in the 21st century American Church though, we struggle with a different reality. As members of the American democratic experiment, we have much more influence over the way we shape our broader society. So, this August we are going back to the Old Testament - to the Minor Prophets. These oracles to the Israelite Kingdoms are incredibly timely. Their cries against widespread and systemic injustice speak to our day and age every bit as much as they did to the kingdoms and powers of their day. Because they longed for justice, the prophets also challenged the people to imagine new ways of being together.

We look forward to learning from these scriptures alongside you, even as we continue discovering new life and connection throughout this strange season.


Stone Church Small Group Fellowship Program

Beginning late August, Stone Church will launch a 10-week program for small group fellowship and reflection. This Zoombased program will serve to help keep us connected as a congregation and deepen our sense of community during this time when we cannot physically be together. The gatherings will center around themed devotionals and related faith and Christian life exploratory questions. Groups will include eight

persons or less to facilitate a space that allows for speaking and listening from the heart and fosters the deepening of our knowing and understanding of each other. Stone Church Leadership Team Meeting "Continuing the work of Jesus. Peacefully. Simply. Together."

Have you ever thought about why you go to church? It may be a deep and abiding faith, a habit that provides comfort and security, a connection with a loving community, a weekly reminder of the person you want to be, or a myriad of other reasons.

The various teams within Stone Church have been asking similar questions over the past several months. At first, it was difficult to move beyond just trying to replicate events that we used to do pre-coronavirus. Rather than questioning why, the question was how – how can we replicate what we have done in the past in these difficult times?

But attempting to replicate handshakes, hugs, the singing of the choir and other activities that just can't happen right now risks creating what is but a pale shadow of previous events. Instead, we are now asking ourselves different questions. What are the most important things about the church? What are the most important things about worship? About Christian Education?

Simply asking these questions results in a valuable analysis and meaningful conversation. It allows each team to then focus creatively on how to offer those important things during this challenging time. It also helps us understand which events may not be meaningful due to coronavirus based restrictions, and where we can better focus our energies.

I'd invite you to take a few minutes and think about why Stone Church is important to you. What are the ways that this congregation touched your life before the coronavirus? What was most important? How does it touch your life now? What is different? What is the same? What's missing? What's better now? I look forward to the development of a vaccine, of being back in our lovely sanctuary, to hearing the voices of the choir. Until that time, I'll think about not just what we have lost during this time, but what we have gained. And I believe that, in the end, we will be a stronger and better church for having asked these questions, and for thinking about what is most important.





This was one of some ten times Scripture reports the Israelites having trouble obeying God in Egypt and while traveling to the Promised Land.

Believe it or not, this story has a point.

Clifton Truman Daniel, grandson of President Harry Truman, is heading a campaign to raise the funds to renovate the Truman Library in Independence, Missouri. He writes of his grandfather's story that, "Only in America could a farm boy from Missouri, with no college degree or wealth...rebuild Europe, found NATO, and stand firm against the growing Communist threat." Truman's slogan heads this column.

But, Daniel writes, "[If we do not] emphasize teaching history and civics in our schools, [we lose] touch with our roots... This should trouble all of us. When a nation doesn't learn from its past, it is doomed to stumble blindly into the future."

We need to remember our history. All of it. To celebrate the good parts, and to be honest about the bad parts.

The Israelites kept forgetting God - even though they had seen incredible wonders just a short time before. And it led to years of stumbling blindly in the wilderness. It's why their children and grand-children decided to tell their story - all of it - the good and the bad, so that they could learn from their past, and find their way to the Promised Land.




Cecilia Grugan, Pam Grugan's daughter, and her partner, Maya Ariel were married Friday, June 26th 2020.


They wanted to share the sentiment about the significance in the date they
