Sojourners Sunday School - More than "a Diasbility"

Are you committed to helping make Stone Church a more deeply authentic home for persons with a variety of disabilities? Wondering how to do that with faithfulness, sensitivity, and a heart for justice? The Sojourners Sunday School class will resume **Sunday, August 27th,** to study a new book that promises to be challenging and thought-provoking in these regards: **From Inclusion to Justice: Disability, Ministry, and Congregational Leadership**. Says the publisher:

American Christianity tends to view disabled persons as problems to be solved rather than people with experiences and gifts that enrich the church. Churches have generated policies, programs, and curricula geared toward "including" disabled people while still maintaining "able-bodied" theologies, ministries, care, and leadership. Ableism—not lack of ramps, of finances, or of accessible worship—is the biggest obstacle for disabled ministry in America. In From Inclusion to Justice, Erin Raffety argues that what our churches need is not more programs for disabled people but rather the pastoral tools to repent of able-bodied theologies and practices, listen to people with disabilities, lament ableism and injustice, and be transformed by God's ministry through disabled leadership. Without a paradigm shift from ministries of inclusion to ministries of justice, our practical theology falls short.

Drawing on ethnographic research with congregations and families, pastoral experience with disabled people, teaching in theological education, and parenting a disabled child, Raffety, an able-bodied Christian writing to able-bodied churches, confesses her struggle to repent from ableism in hopes of convincing others to do the same. At the same time, Raffety draws on her interactions with disabled Christian leaders to testify to what God is still doing in the pews and the pulpit, uplifting and amplifying the ministry and leadership of people with disabilities as a vision toward justice in the kingdom of God.

The class will meet in a hybrid format, with a time of fellowship at 9:15 and the book discussion at 9:30. Leadership will be shared among class participants (with an opt-out option for those who wish). As an added bonus, the author, Erin Raffety, is a personal friend of Pastors Ben and Cindy and has graciously agreed to be a (virtual) guest at one of our sessions!

For details about how to order the book at a discount and to be added to the class email list, please contact Laura White. We hope you'll consider joining us, even if you're unable to attend every week and/or you don't have time to do the readings. We anticipate a lively conversation and would love to have your voice be a part of it!

- **Sojourners Book Study:** Be a part of this group of thoughtful people reflecting together on the intersections between faith and society. These retreats are an opportunity for growth of skills that help us better serve the church and community, planning and coordination, and fellowship with our church family. Gene's Jottings

Did you ever wonder what it would have been like to have been a member of that early Brethren congregation? Well, through the autobiography of an early church member we can get a glimpse of the past. Mrs. Wealthy Clark Burkholder was born in 1849 near Broad Top City, Huntingdon County, and, as fate would have it, she moved to Germany Valley at the age of 12. The following is a portion taken from her book, entitled "Some Things I Remember":

"At the age of twelve we moved near Shirleysburg on a farm, some 20 miles away from my birthplace. Here we were in a Brethren community and in the Aughwick Congregation. At that time there was one meeting house...the old stone church in Germany Valley, about the oldest one in the District, and, at one time it was the Banner congregation of the Middle District of Pa. Regular services were held in Germany Valley every two weeks. By this arrangement all were better supplied with services, and in those early days people went to church in rockaways, on horseback, in wagons, and afoot. Walking was very fashionable. We girls thought nothing of walking two or three miles to any kind of service. There were a number of ministers, too, but sometimes several would be at the meeting. They would have good singing, but all the music was by human voice...no instruments.

This was the first time I had ever seen any of the Dunkard people. I had heard of them only to know they were a very plain and rather queer set of folks...in fact, I was prejudiced against them and said they would not suit me. But there we were, with families on each side: one a good old minister and a lovely daughter, and we found we were among excellent neighbors, who seemed to show more than an ordinary interest in the family moving into their midst. Our schoolhouse was near and we were anxious to see these oddly dressed folks, as we then thought, and see how they conducted their meetings. We went and went again and found we were entirely mistaken...they were as kind, good and Christianlike as other churches."


