From the Pastors' Desk

"Maybe the play wasn't about miracles. No, maybe it was about the passage of time, and the need for patience, and the ability to forgive. Maybe Shakespeare was saying that even in a world where miracles can happen, there's still going to be pain, and loss, and regret. Because sometimes people die and you can't



bring them back. That's what life is Joseph realized, miracles and sadness, side by side." - Brian Selznick in The Marvels

Everett brought home Brian Selznick's book, *The Marvels* and I could not put it down. Three of the five of us read it and have continued to ponder its beauty together. I highly recommend it to you! This powerful image of life being full of miracles and sadness, side by side, spoke deeply to me in connection with the story of Advent and Christmas as well.

As we move through the season of Advent we will look at the stories leading up to the birth of Jesus - the sadness and pain of Elizabeth and Zechariah's infertility, right alongside the miracle of John's birth. The fear and danger for a young Mary, right alongside her determination and hope. The Bible story does not show us a neat, curated picture of the world only rejoicing. It shows us the complicated reality of joy and grief and pain all mixed together.


And it is not just the Bible story that contains this mixture. Our own stories are full of delight and sorrow. Our world is plagued with violence and despair - even as it is also filled with beauty and new life. I think of the people we have lost this year, the war in Israel and Gaza, the health issues and struggles around us; and I confess that I am weary...AND hopeful.

This is the story of the Incarnation - of the miracle of God coming to dwell among us in the midst of the real world - with all its suffering and sanctity. This is Christmas - miracle and sadness, side by side.

Our worship theme for Advent is, How Does a Weary World Rejoice? How do we faithfully, thoughtfully, creatively hold this miracle and this weariness all together? How might you engage in the season in ways that bring healing, hope, compassion, and peace for yourself and for others? Can we find ways to experience the weariness of the world while also recognizing and celebrating the nearness of God?

Each Sunday in worship, we will tell stories and sing songs. Instead of one large pageant, we will have mini-pageants each week - a way of mixing joy into all we do. There will be an opportunity each week to look at art together and reflect. We are planning a special service for the weary on a Sunday night - it will be a time for silence and healing. We will go caroling together and gather at the Alternative Christmas Gifts Bazaar. There are Advent Calendars available filled with activities to guide us; as well as devotional books for everyone so that we can center deeply into the season. And we will gather on Christmas Eve - we will light candles and let ourselves be drawn into the holy...

A thrill of hope the weary world rejoices, For yonder breaks a new and glorious morn; Fall on your knees, Oh hear the angel voices! O night divine! O night when Christ was born. O night, O holy night, O night divine.

that tucked us all in.


And in between these small gifts there were newborn babies, and sapling trees, homemade bread, the sound of a church singing on Sunday.

What's one way our weary world can rejoice? Be a Texting Buddy!

Eddie Crader and I have been "Texting Buddies" since the spring of 2020. He offered to help me water flowers each day. The Stone Church Ministry is Strong: Can our giving sustain it?

So far, Stone Church members and friends have returned 43 pledges for 2024 giving totaling \$158,392. This compares to 57 pledges for the 2023 budget year totaling \$229,000. Also, through October of 2023 our expenses have exceeded giving by \$30,017. Stone Church has financial reserves that will allow us to support our ministry through a few years of deficit spending at the level we expect for 2023. As your Leadership Team builds the budget for 2024, they will be challenged. If you have pledged, please consider whether you are able to increase that pledge. If you have not yet pledged, please make a commitment to sustaining the ministry in which we share. Finally, please plan to attend congregational forums set for Sunday December 3rd, January 7th and January 28th, so that together we can discuss the joyous work we share and how we can best continue that work.

Friends of the Asturias Academy Annual Support Request



Dear Asturias Academy Supporters,

As Giving Tuesday fast approaches and your email inboxes are inundated with requests for financial support, I bring greetings from our friends and partners at the Asturias Academy and extend my annual plea for you to generously support the little Guatemalan school that COULD despite the obstacles they constantly have to surmount.

This academic year marked a return to in-person instruction for the first time in nearly three years, which presented challenges but was also a great joy for students, faculty, and staff. First, the good news: there were 132 students enrolled from pre-school through 9th grade, and this year there were no withdrawals and all 132 students successfully moved on to the next grade level. Being back in school enabled our partners to fully implement their transformative pedagogy of monthly generative themes and culminating activities such as a visit to a rural health center, planting seedlings in a nearby valley, and a panel discussion on corruption, democracy, and socio-economic differences in preparation for the August presidential election. They also resumed the annual school field trip for the first time since 2019, this year to the indigenous ruins of lximché and the historic colonial capital of Antigua, as well as the annual trek up the Santa María volcano and the celebration of the school's anniversary the first week in August, complete with the election of student government officers, soccer and basketball tournaments, and artistic presentations and food delivery at a residential facility for impoverished senior women.

In his annual report, school co-founder and principal Jorge Chojolán identified four challenges the school has faced this year:

- Student socio-emotional issues such as anxiety, fear, and irritability triggered by pandemic
 isolation and ongoing economic and political conditions in Guatemala, particularly among
 younger children who were attending in-person classes for the first time. In response, the
 staff instituted what they called "friendly classrooms" and carried out a series of fun and
 group-building activities for all students.
- Student dependency on technology, primarily cell phones, and cyber bullying and harassment, particularly among the older students. The school created a counseling program and brought in professionals who offered presentations on strategies for handling these situations for students, parents, and teachers.
- A budget deficit from declining enrollments, down from 142 in 2022, 160 in 2021, and 215 in 2020 prior to the onset of the pandemic, as well as a reduction in charitable giving, which was essentially limited this year to donations given through Stone Church and scholarship support for girls from the Gendercide Awareness Project. To balance the budget, Jorge was forced to reduce administrative salaries and the number of half scholarships granted to only eight, while still offering 25 full scholarships to the students with greatest need and maintaining teachers' salaries.
- Government corruption, which often takes the form of attempts to extort money from the school. This year, the Ministry of Education decided to mandate the purchase of a biodigester, typically only required of large restaurants to break down generated waste, and they requested that the school change the windows and install a new door so there would be a separate entrance and exit. The school joined with other schools to file an appeal that resulted in a temporary suspension of the mandates.

Another way to support the Asturias Academy is through participation in our Summer 2024 delegations. There will actually be three options:

1) June 10th to 21st – a new elementary delegation especially for kids who have completed kindergarten through 6th grade and their parents, who will be matched with students at the AA for an experiential language and cultural learning experience. 2) June 22nd to 30th – a medical delegation that will hold health clinics at the AA and possibly a more rural location. 3) July 1st to 12th – an educational delegation that will prepare and share enrichment learning activities and complete maintenance projects at the school as well as engaging in cultural tourism, with the opportunity to also study Spanish in small groups or one-on-one.

The cost for the Guatemala delegations is \$1,800 for adults, \$1,600 for college students, and \$1,400 for children and youth, which includes round-trip airfare and the basic in-country expenses of transportation and room & board. Participation in additional programs costs only \$400 each. For the elementary delegation, which is likely a one-time offering, there is a reduced price for multiple parents and children, and the Leadership Team has committed to providing a \$500 scholarship for Stone Church children. As you consider Giving Tuesday and year-end charitable contributions, remember that virtually 100% of your monetary gift goes directly to program expenses and will have an extraordinary impact at the school. For only \$50 per month, under \$2 a day, you can provide a deserving child a full scholarship that covers tuition, all necessary school supplies, and a school uniform. A half scholarship costs less than \$1 per day, but any amount you can contribute will go a long way toward helping our partners accomplish their empowering educational mission.

A third option is to donate through the school's web site, although if you do so there, the fundraising platform will take a small cut of your gift.

On behalf of our partners and friends at the Asturias Academy, mil gracias for any support you can offer to make possible the life-changing gift of education for Guatemalan children and youth.


