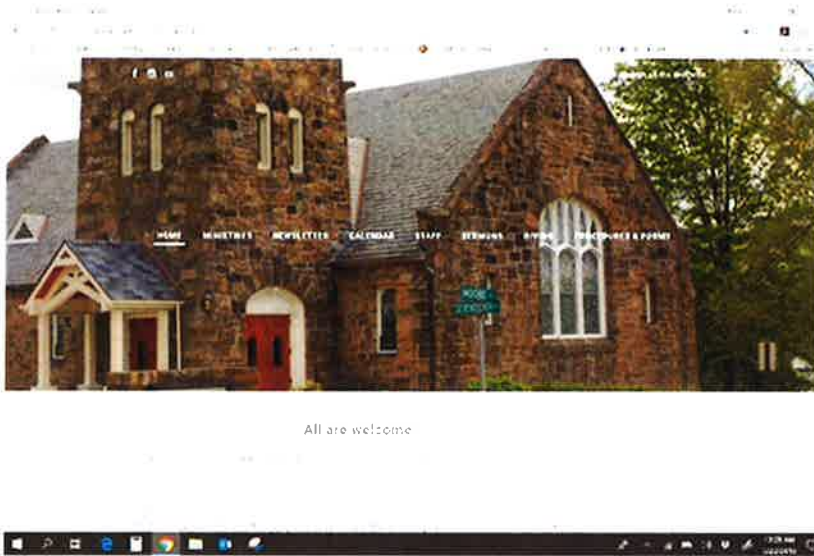

*The meal is pot-luck -- bring your own table service and a dish to share as we enjoy some time on the lake together.*

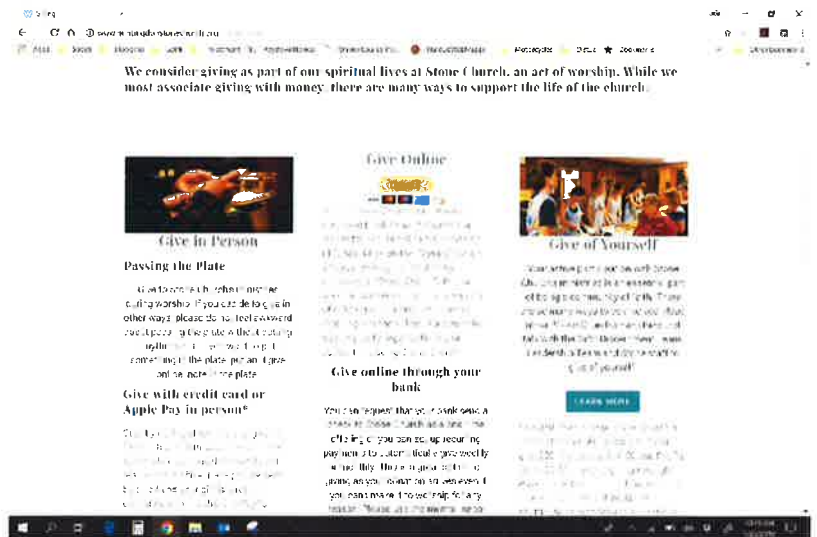
# Come home to the home page...When was the last time you've been home?

For the last year or two Stone Church Deacons' have been struggling to find ways to be effective caregivers. It was decided at our February meeting that we would form sub-groups to use our spiritual gifts and energy to be more specific in our caregiving. We have developed the following small groups within the deacon team: Greeting Cards; Prepare & Assist for Love Feast/Communion; Transportation, Visitation, Assist with Anointing; Prepare & Deliver Meals; Prayer; Assist with Baptisms; Bible Study Leaders. Your Deacon, as listed on pages 11-13 in the 2018 Stone Church Directory, will continue in their role as "your deacon."

As needs arise in the congregation, a Deacon may contact others for help. The Gifts Discernment Survey is a wonderful tool for those willing to serve to be identified – we plan to take advantage of this information! We hope to be available and efficient in meeting the needs that are made known to us. ## **We Remember.....**

### **Dorothy Longenecker**

August 26, 1919 – April 24, 2018

Dorothy "Dot" M. Longenecker was born in Pittsburgh, PA and moved as an infant with her parents, Silas and Celia (Newman) Wilt to Huntingdon. She married James Longenecker who preceded her in death in 2003. Dorothy has one daughter, Debra Garman, who resides in Alexandria with her husband, Robert, and they have one son, James Garman, who lives in Jacksonville, FL. Debbie lived just down the road from Dorothy and would visit with her mother every day as well as assist her with laundry, shopping and other necessities. Dorothy's grandson, James, loved his grandmother dearly and visited with her whenever he was home in Huntingdon, and the feeling was mutual – Dorothy was very proud of her grandson!

Dorothy has been a member of the Stone Church of the Brethren all her life and was married here to James Longenecker on September 30, 1950. She grew up in a wonderful neighborhood of friends and family and has fond memories of their times together on each other's porches playing games and visiting with each other. She especially was grateful for and felt close to her cousin, Orpha Hearn, with whom she continued to spend time with at the monthly Older Adult luncheons, and later at AristaCare where they both resided. Dorothy has not been able to attend Sunday morning worship or be involved with the activities of Stone Church for several years due to ongoing health issues but she always looked forward to staying connected through the monthly luncheons.

Through the years Dorothy was employed at various doctors' offices and J.C. Blair Hospital and then at Owens Corning Fiberglass from which she retired. When Dorothy was able, she was active in the community, serving as a member of the PA Grange, the Petersburg Homemakers and the Standing Stone Senior Center. In her younger years, Dorothy enjoyed knitting, crocheting and reading and until recently still worked on her word puzzles. One of her favorite things to do was to watch and feed the birds in the beautiful setting of her own backyard. And she was quite the fan of country and gospel music – always talking about attending the Hootenanny at the Lions Barn just down the road from her home! ## Something Old, But Something New Too!

Earlier in May, Stone Church again started collecting everyone's unneeded coinage for a good cause. Middle PA District has included ***Pennies For Witness*** in its outreach ministry giving for many years; and Stone Church used to participate in the endeavor. When I attended the 2017 District Conference, I was reminded of Stone Church's past involvement. Having been convinced that it was a "right fit" for us, I met with Witness Team and received their endorsement.

In this newsletter issue, I would like to share one of the 5 Outreach Ministries, *Pennies For Witness* helps make possible: *Trucker Traveler Ministries*. The location is that busy spot in Breezewood, PA. Chaplain Bruce Maxwell, a very likeable guy, is there to be a friend to truckers and other travelers in crisis. The emphasis is on offering support to the truckers for a reason. Have you ever had occasion to talk to the folks who move our goods around the country? It can be a lonely and isolated life. On more than one occasion, I have overheard a truck driver trying to handle a problem at home over the telephone. And, runaway girls often end up riding with truckers. This situation can have serious long term consequences for the drivers and their pickup companions. Chaplain Bruce Maxwell, with his non-judgmental relational style, has been able to help both parties make better decisions.

Look for the *Pennies For Witness* collection tub on the stand in the Narthex each Sunday morning; or in the church office on weekdays. A sign next to it briefly describes all five supported ministries.

If you are like my extended family, there is plenty of loose change you could contribute to this worthy cause! No worries, if you forget to bring it this week. Your loose change and dollar bills will be collected until the Wednesday before November's District Conference.

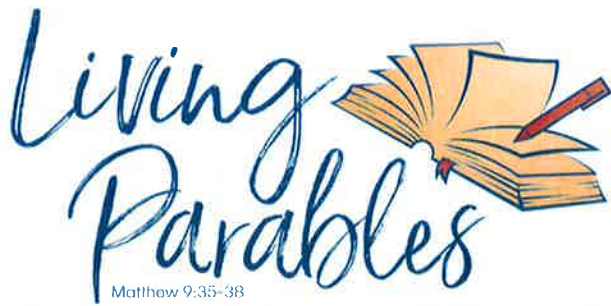
## Women's District Retreat Report

This year's Middle PA District Women's Retreat was held May 10-11 at Laurel Lodge on Halbritter's Estates, near Duncansville. It's a beautiful setting on the side of a mountain. Marlys Hershberger, pastor of Hollidaysburg CoB, led the sessions, using the theme "Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming." Isaiah 58: 8a & 11 scripture reads: "like a rose, we were created to reach toward the light and bloom." Women gathered to share in the light and healing waters of God's love as revealed in Jesus and the Holy Spirit. The group explored ways to open and bloom in God's loving light through bible study, shared meditation, small group discussions and sometimes, alone with God. ### NYC SERVICE PROJECTS – Please Help By Donating (needed by July 20<sup>th</sup>)

- **Brethren Disaster Relief Clean Up Bucket Supplies:** scouring pads, sponges, scrub brushes, reusable cleaning towels (e.g. Easy Wipes), clothespins, 50 ft – 100 ft clotheslines, dust masks, non-surgical non-latex gloves, pairs of cotton with leather palm or all leather work gloves, heavy duty or contractor type 30-45 gallon trash bags, and 6-9 oz. bottles of non-aerosol insect repellent.
- **T-shirt Diapers for Midwives For Haiti** Clean out your closet! Bring t-shirts you don't wear any more (no stretchy material-preferably cotton & any color is fine). We will be tracing and cutting out diaper patterns as part of our service projects. They will then be sewn by CoB churches and sent to orphanages in Haiti through Midwives for Haiti. They use about 200 diapers a month, and that is only supplying each baby 1 diaper.

## MESSENGER MUSINGS

### "PRAYING FOR TIME"



When I'm concentrating on my seemingly endless list of personal health issues, I think of the lady who sits behind me in church, Mrs. June Peters. June has been struggling for more than three years with very serious injuries she suffered when driving to church one Sunday morning. I've always enjoyed talking to June, liking to remind her when the month named for her – June – is upon us. Her husband, Bill, has been there for her as she works to get well; just as my Alberta is for me.

I've been telling June about a song I discovered – "Praying for Time" – written 30 years ago by singer-composer George Michael. This song, which reached Number One, lamented the human condition – still with us today – especially at this time of national turmoil.

Excerpts:

"THE RICH DECLARE THEMSELVES POOR,  
AND MOST OF US ARE NOT SURE IF WE HAVE TOO MUCH  
BUT WE'LL TAKE OUR CHANCES BECAUSE GOD'S STOPPED KEEPING SCORE.  
I GUESS SOMEWHERE ALONG THE WAY HE MUST HAVE LET US ALL OUT TO PLAY,  
TURNED HIS BACK AND ALL GOD'S CHILDREN CREPT OUT THE BACK DOOR."  
"SO YOU SCREAM FROM BEHIND YOUR DOOR  
SAY, "WHAT'S MINE IS MINE AND NOT YOURS.  
I MAY HAVE TOO MUCH BUT I'LL TAKE MY CHANCES."

"THESE ARE THE DAYS OF THE EMPTY HAND; OH YOU HOLD ON TO WHAT YOU CAN  
AND CHARITY IS A COAT YOU WEAR TWICE A YEAR.  
THIS IS THE YEAR OF THE GUILTY MAN. YOUR TELEVISION TAKES A STAND  
AND YOU FIND THAT WHAT WAS OVER THERE IS OVER HERE.

"IT'S HARD TO LOVE, THERE'S SO MUCH TO HATE.  
HANGING ONTO HOPE WHEN THERE IS NO HOPE TO SPEAK OF  
AND THE WOUNDED SKIES ABOVE SAY IT'S MUCH TOO LATE,  
SO MAYBE WE SHOULD ALL BE PRAYING FOR TIME."

Has anything changed since George Michael wrote those words in 1990? George died Christmas morning 2016. He was 53. ...And then there's this, which was found among poems collected by the Rev. Albert M. Haught, May 16, 1992.

THERE ONCE WAS A FISHER NAMES FISCHER  
WHO FISHED TOO CLOSE TO A FISSURE.  
A FISH, WITH A GRIN, PULLED THE FISHERMAN IN,  
AND NOW THEY'RE FISHING THE FISSURE FOR FISCHER.

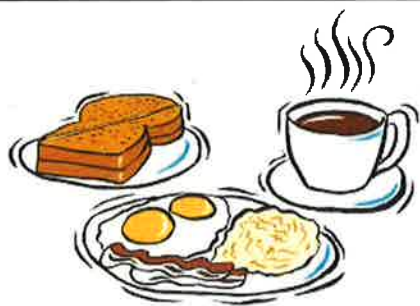
