From the Pastors' Desk



Summer is here! And for many of us, the summer will be filled with travel and adventures. Our family is headed to Guatemala together with a delegation working with our Stone Church partner school! And we'll be gathering with Brethren from around the world in Michigan for Annual Conference. (Where Cindy will be preaching this year!) Where are you headed this summer?

Cindy came across an article the other day by Brenda Peconge. She writes:

My parents loved to travel.... My grandmother would often join us, and one of my earliest travel memories is standing with her at the lighthouse in Marblehead, Ohio, and hearing her say, "Let your light so shine before others that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven," as we stood admiring the lighthouse and the beauty of Creation around us.

As we travel this summer, Peconge suggests 3 opportunities for intentionally experiencing God's presence and shining our light...

- **Soak in the journey itself** - not just as a means to a destination, but as its own experience. And she invites us to "be open to re-direction along the way." That curiosity and openness can make room for joy.
- **Take time to really see the places you visit.** Pay attention to the beauties of the natural world around you, and think about the history of the place - its story - and the depth of human experience it speaks to.
- **Collect the stories** of the people you meet. Train your eyes to see not just the people you *plan* to visit - but fellow travelers along the way, even the hotel workers and gas station attendants too - each one, a child of God, bearing the image of God - an opportunity to encounter the divine.

This Stone Church family is a real gift. Not just to each of us who are a part of it - but to the world. The community we build together has a way of spilling out. As we are shaped by our experiences together - made better by each other - we carry that out into the world. There's a ripple effect. And God only knows how much good we can do.

Jesus said, "You are the light of the world." So, wherever you travel this summer may your light shine! Wherever you are - whether here in Huntingdon or out traveling the world - may others see your good works and glorify God.

What are our priorities?

What are our priorities?

At the congregational family meeting in May, we focused on some broad questions. Below is an early summary of the results. The Leadership Team will take a closer look at these to help guide our work in the coming year.

What are the places where the existence of Stone Church matters to you, to the Huntingdon community, and to the world?

For many, Stone Church helps provide a sense of purpose, brings hope, and energizes us. It reminds us of our priorities and gives us a sense of perspective, especially in the light of so much negative news. Our community provides opportunities for friendships of all ages, helps us feel and physically be cared for, and provides a community to raise our children. Worship together is important to us, for the music and the sermons, for the way it strengthens our faith and challenges us. Stone Church also educates us and our children, about our faith, about sustainability, and about other social justice issues.

“Stone Church gives me energy to focus on being a positive”

Stone has a significant impact beyond its walls. The faith, education, and energy we receive from Stone changes our lives, and therefore alters how we behave and treat others and inspires us to share our resources. We provide a safe space for college students and for people who feel marginalized to worship. Our members support the prison and reentry ministry, the farmers market (including Market Bucks), food bank, Hometown Hearts, the Asturias Academy, the Alternative Christmas Gifts Bazaar, and more. This support comes in many forms, through time and talents, and through financial gifts through the church and independently.

Our experiences at Stone act as a catalyst for changes in our own lives, which then impact the broader community.

What are the places where we need to put more energy to sustain the things that matter most?

We listed several things that are important to sustain what matters most, and then identified those that needed additional energy or attention. One top item identified was the long-term financial health of the church – to support our pastors, minister of music, maintain our building, and keep our commitment to witness. The other top items all related to active attendance and participation, as well as cultivating a sense of ownership and responsibility within the church family.

Changes to the Church Organizational Calendar

The Leadership Team, with feedback from the ministry teams and deacons, recently made some changes to the church organizational calendar. These changes help distribute things throughout the year and align better with the natural energy of different seasons.

The budget year will continue to run from Jan 1- Dec 31 and yearly personnel contracts will continue to start on February 1. The major change is that team chairs and deacons will start their terms on June 1 instead of January 1. In other words, we'll think of our "team year" ending in May, which is more aligned with the energy of the school year. In May we will celebrate and look back on the year past and identify our priorities for the coming year. Throughout the summer, teams, depending on their role, will continue work as usual, consider how to implement priorities, and maybe even get some time to rest. In late August we will celebrate the rising energy of the fall with our welcome meal. Below is a simplified version of the organizational calendar. STONE CHURCH CHILDREN MEET HOMETOWN HEARTS

At an event coordinated by Anne Rice - Everett, Cyrus, and Ezra Lattimer, Max and Sydney Paterson and Maddix Uhrich, as well as their parents Pastor Ben, Robin and Charlie Paterson, and Jeremy Uhrich gathered on the corner of the St. James Lutheran Church parking lot, 525 Mifflin Street, at 6:00 p.m. on Thursday, February 29, 2024.

Anne led the group into the fellowship hall, where the eager participants observed the in-person distribution of a Hometown Hearts Thursday night meal. Hometown Hearts coordinator Michele Rupert welcomed the group and shared information about the organization's origin and purpose.



After racing back to St. James' parking lot, the children loaded into their cars. With an adult behind the steering wheel, the cars formed a convoy and followed Anne's car all the way to the Dollar General on Moore Street. There Anne gave each child two bags, each containing a main course, a salad, and a dessert. The group marched across 9th Street to meet the waiting recipients at DeForrest Apartments. While Anne greeted each recipient by name, the children distributed their hand-delivered bags of turkey with mashed potatoes, vegetables and a sweet treat.

On Thursday, March 21, 2024 Pastor Ben, Everett, Ezra, and Cyrus Lattimer joined Anne Rice and Pam Grugan at St. James once more. This time Anthony Bullett gave a tour of the Hometown Hearts pantry. We crammed inside the small space and learned about the sources of the food Hometown Hearts distributes, sources like donations from Walmart and Sheetz, as well as the Pennsylvania Food Bank. The tour ended with parachuting Easter bunnies and lollipops, before we all headed to the cars, convoyed over to DeForrest Apartments, and passed out yummy Shepherd's Pies.

Oh! And one more thing: Natalie and Beau Buterbaugh have been helping their parents, Jessica and Cory Buterbaugh, one Thursday EVERY MONTH to deliver Hometown Hearts meals to folks who live at DeForrest Apartments. What a team!

Adrienne Willhoft and The Stone Church of the Brethren A Partnership



When Adrienne Willhoft reached out to our pastors in the summer of 2023, she was working with Juniata College students as advisor to Juniata Christian Fellowship (JCF), a position she has held for the past five years. The purpose of her work is “coming alongside students for these years to help them grow in the Lord (and) learn what it means to be in relationship with other Christians.” While this position falls under the purview of the Coalition for Christian Outreach (CCO), Adrienne is required to fundraise for the financial support of the position. Thus, Adrienne met with Witness Team member Pam Grugan in August of 2023 and with the rest of Witness Team in September. In January 2024, Witness Team members decided to support her work financially with \$100 per month.

During our fall meetings with Adrienne, we learned that she grew up in the Christian and Missionary Alliance Church. Her years at summer camp were highly influential for her faith and movement toward ministry. She later worked in camp ministry and spent time serving overseas before joining CCO in Pittsburgh. There she spent the majority of her time planning and leading outdoor activities. Adrienne also completed a degree program at Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary. She is currently attending services at St. John’s Episcopal Church.

Since our initial meeting, Adrienne has sent Witness Team members three JCF newsletter editions, attended two Witness Team meetings*, and on April 7th, Adrienne preached for our congregation. We’ve learned about JCF’s growing membership, that more Juniata College students and staff (42) attended Jubilee Conference this year than ever before, and that students and professors have been taking on leadership roles for many JCF small groups. Celebrating 11 years of service with Coalition for Christian Outreach, Adrienne will be on sabbatical from mid-June through the end of October for “a season of restoration, prayer and discernment,” as well as beginning a certificate in Spiritual Direction. On behalf of our Stone Church family, Witness Team thanks Adrienne for her commitment to JC students’ spiritual growth, wishes her well during her sabbatical, and looks forward to her return in the fall.

A Visit With Two Special Guests

In the spring of 2022, Witness Team member Martha Swigart contacted Elody Gyekis (Anna Mow's great-granddaughter and Harriet Kaylor's first cousin twice removed) to request that she consider designing a quilt that would represent Stone Church's Welcome Statement, adopted by our congregation at the January 2012 forum. That first contact was the beginning of many months of meetings and planning until August 2023, when local quilter Linda Taylor presented Martha and the Witness Team with the finished product.



Several months later, on Friday, February 16, 2024, Witness Team member Anne Rice welcomed two special guests to see our new Welcome Statement Quilt, hanging in the narthex. Elody Gyekis and her mother Loanne Snavelly stood quietly while they drank in every detail. Anne Rice says, "When I opened the door and we walked in, they had big smiles on their faces.

They both were so very pleased with how the quilt had turned out and thought that where it's hanging is most appropriate. Along with Martha Swigart and the rest of the Witness Team, I had worked with Elody for many months. Now we were able to stand together, looking at the message in the quilt Elody designed, and know that it will continue to bless anyone that stands before it."

Before Elody and Loanne went on their way, Anne gave them one of the wooden puzzles, which Cory Buterbaugh and a colleague created for the September 3, 2023, presentation of the Welcome Statement Quilt to the congregation. Elody and Loanne were delighted with the gift and its message. Like the patches of the quilt, the pieces of the puzzle represent a coming together of all God's people, creating a puzzle into which "your piece" fits perfectly with the Stone Church Family.

Gene's Jottings - "CNAs and Me"

When I say the words hospital, doctor or nurse, you know what I mean. And you probably know someone who works in those occupations. But mention someone who is a "certified nursing assistant" and you may draw a blank stare. I recently returned from five and a half months in the Embassy Woodland Park rehabilitation center in Orbisonia. Woodland Park has oodles of CNAs to take care of people like me. They feed us, take us for showers, change our diapers, change our clothes, listen to our cries for help and do other duties to keep the place running.

I've been to Woodland a number of times since back surgery in 2018 left me unable to walk. So many of them would exchange a "hello" with me and I would like to list the names of a dozen or so of my CNAs, who I believe are the unsung heroes of places like Woodland. I would also like to list six LPNs (Licensed practical nurses) who pass out pills, creams and foul-tasting liquids sometimes hidden in spoonfuls of pudding. The LPNs would regularly track down their "subjects" like me to satisfy my 16 prescriptions.

CNAs: Racheal, Mackenzie, Macy, Payton, Lydia, Kendra, Heather, Nikki, Jayla, Renee, Cassie, Sherry, Abbie, Jessica and Jamie. Jamie is also the receptionist.

LPNs: Jessica, Stephanie, Madison, Tona and Larain. Stephanie and Tona have been with me at Woodland for six years and Madison is Tona's daughter. I nicknamed Madison "Mach 5" for her skill, speed, and refusal to laugh at all of my jokes.

I also want to mention, Hayley, a part-time receptionist out of Southern Huntingdon, and daughter of one of the other team members there. Last but not least, Allyson, head of the Activities Department. Besides being a great help to me, she was an officer there when my mother was a resident at Woodland for about six years.

These unsung heroes faithfully care day in and day out for folks like me... So, if you ever find yourself in a nursing home, remember the CNAs.
